- 4. Examine, identify, and adopt aesthetic principles based on study of model texts, workshop texts, and their own writing and place their own work within a larger tradition.
- 5. Compose a portfolio of work demonstrating their development as writers and critical thinkers working to master the CW/ENGL program's essential skills and values, including craft and the recursive nature of the creative process.
