Video Games!!!







New Digital Resources



The African American Experience (AAE) is a full-text digital resource exploring the history and culture of African Americans, as well as the greater Black Diaspora. Wide-ranging and easy-to-use, AAE is the definitive electronic research tool for African American history and culture from one of the most respected publishers in the field. Its two primary goals: to provide rock-solid information from authorities in the field, and to allow African Americans to speak for themselves through a wealth of primary sources. Drawing on over 400 volumes, and designed under the guidance of leading librarians of color, this database gives voice to the black experience from its African origins to the present day.

The American Indian Experience (AIE) is a full-text digital resource exploring the histories and contemporary cultures of the indigenous peoples of the United States. The American Indian Experience offers access to an online library, featuring more than 150 volumes of scholarship and reference content, hundreds of primary documents, and thousands of images. From Pre-contact to the present day, from the Inuit of the north to the Seminoles of Florida, AIE is meant for anyone wishing to learn more about America's Native Peoples.

The Latino American Experience (LAE) is a full-text digital resource exploring the history and culture of U.S. Latinos. Wide-ranging and easy to use, LAE is the first-ever full-text database focusing on the history and culture of Latinos living in the United States. Its content spans from the pre-Columbian Indigenous civilizations of the Americas, through the Spanish and Mexican settlement of much of what is now the United States, to the triumphs and challenges facing present-day U.S. Latinos.

Research Reminders

IM The Answer: Library staff members are available to answer your research and general library questions through Instant Messenger. If you have an AOL or Yahoo instant messenger account, contact us at **pointlibim**. This service is available during our business hours.

Email Your Questions: Library staff are available to answer your questions via email. Staff will typically answer questions from 8:00am-midnight.

EZ Borrow: If there is a book you need that the Library does not have, EZ Borrow s allows you to search the catalogs of a number of different academic library catalogs to find what you are looking for. If the material is available via EZ Borrow, it will be delivered to the Library for you to pick up and you will be notified of delivery via e-mail. Loan period is 4 weeks with one renewal.

Laptops: Laptops with wireless access are available at the Reference Desk for students to check out and use in the library.

Research Consultations: If you are in need of assistance with a research paper or topic, make an appointment to meet with a librarian individually.
