#### **University Organization**

Point Park University is organized into two operational divisions: The Office of Academic and Student Affairs and the Office of Finance and Operations. Each division is led by a provost and a senior vice president, respectively, who report to the president, Dr. Paul Hennigan. Other senior leadership positions include the Senior Vice President and General Counsel, Vice President of Enrollment Management, and Vice President for Development and Alumni Relations.

The Office of Academic and Student Affairs includes all academic programs, faculty and academic support staff, as well as the Office of Students Affairs, the Office of the Registrar, the Office of Institutional Research and Planning, the Library and the Division of Online Learning. This division is led by Dr. Karen S. McIntyre, Provost, Chief Academic Officer and Dean of Faculty.

The Office of Finance and Operations includes the Office of Human Resources, the Office of Business Services, the Office of Finance, Information Technology Services, Public Safety, which includes environmental, health and safety, Operations, which includes facilities, transportation and conferences/events, and the University Architect/Planner. This division is led by Bridget Mancosh, the Senior Vice President for Finance and Operations.

Other senior level functions that report directly to the President include: Office of the General Counsel, led by Senior Vice President and General Counsel, Amy McCall; the Office of Development and Alumni Affairs, led by Vice President, Sharon Navoney; the Office of Special Campaigns, led by Vice President, Rick Haskins; External Affairs, including Marketing and Communications, led by Vice President, Mariann Geyer; Enrollment Management, including Full-time Admissions, Graduate Admissions, International Student Services and Enrollment, Enrollment Marketing, and Financial Aid, led by Vice President, Gary Bracken.

# **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### **History of the University**

Throughout its history, Point Park University has taken pride in its urban roots and contributions to the vitality of downtown Pittsburgh.

The University began as the Business Training College (BTC), which was founded in 1933 by Dr. Dorothy and L. Herbert Finkelhor as a proprietary school that prepared students for careers in the business world. BTC was located in downtown Pittsburgh.

In 1960, the state of Pennsylvania chartered BTC as Point Park Junior College, a tax-exempt institution of higher education. The College was re-chartered as Point Park College in 1966 and began awarding bachelor's degrees. Its first graduate program (journalism and communications) was established in 1981.

Point Park was granted university status by the Pennsylvania Department of Education in October 2003.

Point Park University acquired The Pittsburgh Playhouse (now Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse) in 1968. Its main campus remains in downtown Pittsburgh and includes more than 16 properties, including academic, administrative and residence halls.

To meet its growing needs, the University has acquired various downtown properties during the past several years. As one of the largest property owners in downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park's footprint extends down the Wood Street corridor from the Monongahela River to Forbes Avenue.

Approximately 4,000 students are enrolled at the University.

#### **University Profile**

Located in Downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park University is a comprehensive master's level university with a strong liberal arts tradition. Point Park enrolls approximately 4,000 full and part-time students in more than 100 undergraduate and graduate programs offered through its four schools. Its students represent 46 states and 44 countries.

Point Park offers bachelor's and associate's degrees in a number of majors, including accounting, acting, allied health, animation and visual effects, behavioral sciences, biological sciences, broadcast production and media management, broadcasting reporting, business, business management, cinema production, civil engineering technology, criminal justice, dance (with concentrations in ballet, modern and jazz), dance pedagogy, economics and finance, early childhood education (assoc. only), education (pre-K–4<sup>th</sup> grade), education ( $4^{th}-8^{th}$  grade), English, English/creative writing, electrical engineering technology, forensic science, funeral service, global cultural studies, history, human resource management, information technology, instructional studies, intelligence and national security, interdisciplinary studies, journalism, leadership and public service, legal studies, liberal studies, mass communication, mechanical engineering technology, multimedia, musical theatre, organizational leadership, photography, photojournalism, political science, premedical and preprofessional studies, psychology, public administration, public relations and advertising, screenwriting, secondary education (biological sciences, citizenship, English, mathematics, social studies), sports, arts and entertainment management, theater arts: performance and practices, theatre production (stage management, design, technical design/management).

The University has earned national distinction in a number of fields, including dance, theater, journalism and mass communication, and sports, arts and entertainment management.

The University also awards seventeen master's degrees and two doctorate degrees: the master of arts degree includes the following majors: clinical-community psychology, communication technology, curriculum and instruction, educational administration, intelligence and global security, leadership, media communication; the master of education degree includes: secondary education certification grades 7-12, special education grades 7-12, special education prek-grade8; the master of fine arts in writing for the screen and stage; the mba degree includes: master of business administration, global management and administration; the master of science degree includes: criminal justice administration, engineering management, environmental studies, healthcare administration and management; the doctor of education in leadership and administration; and the doctor of philosophy in community engagement.

Learning is an interactive process at Point Park where the average class size is between 15-20 students. Point Park University Online offers online degree programs in a flexible format.

University facilities include engineering technology, science and computer labs; a television studio; photo and cinema labs; dance studios; and a radio station. Performing arts majors gain practical experience at Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse.

In recent years, the University launched the Academic Village at Point Park University, a multiblock living and learning hub that is transforming the University campus and the Downtown neighborhood it inhabits. It is redefining the student experience, campus life and Point Park's connection to the community.

As part of the Academic Village:

- Students, city residents and businesspeople are interacting in the Village Park, completed in 2011.
- World-class speakers, spirited performances, and athletic activities will inform and delight students in a new Student and Convocation Center.
- 40,000 theatergoers will attend performances at the Pittsburgh Playhouse, soon-to-be located in the heart of Downtown Pittsburgh.
- Environmentally friendly building techniques are creating sustainable additions to a revitalized Downtown district and campus.
- The energy and vitality of the 24/7 Academic Village will pulse across Downtown neighborhoods and unite Market Square and the Cultural District.

#### **Central Campus Development Project**

Point Park's vision is to be one of the most dynamic private, urban universities in America. The vision begins with facilities that give students, faculty, and staff the environment they need to excel.

In 2011, Point Park completed the Village Park. Located at Wood Street and Boulevard of the Allies, the 12,000-square-foot park features a canopy of trees, colorful plantings, a stunning glass stair tower, a dramatic water feature and a colonnade structure as well as a lively restaurant featuring indoor and outdoor dining areas.

In addition, the University completed Wood Street streetscape enhancements that include new sidewalks, pedestrian-friendly traffic signals and street resurfacing, in the fall of 2012.

Future projects include the Student and Convocation Center, which will incorporate a multipurpose student lounge, advanced computer labs, a fully equipped fitness center, and a 1,000-seat auditorium that transforms into an 1,800 seat space for convocation and community events.

#### Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse

In 1968, Point Park breathed new life into the Pittsburgh Playhouse by converting it into the University's performing arts center. Now, Point Park will reinvigorate the Pittsburgh arts scene once again with the construction of a new Pittsburgh Playhouse on Forbes Avenue in Downtown Pittsburgh.

This premier performance and teaching venue will provide world-class professional spaces for both unconventional and classical presentations developed by the faculty, students and visiting artists of the Conservatory of Performing Arts. Students will benefit from a truly professional theater experience provided by three new performance spaces. An adjacent 10,000 square foot production area, costume and prop shops, and chorus and dressing rooms will allow backstage and production students to study and learn in a real-world environment.

#### **George Rowland White Performance Center**

Point Park University is an institution that utilizes green principles as it renovates. The George Rowland White Performance Center, which opened in August 2007, was awarded Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design or LEED Gold, one of the highest levels of certification in the U.S. Green Building Council's building performance program. The building is the first of its kind to receive LEED-NC Gold for new construction, according to USGBC statistics.

The George Rowland White Performance Center is a 44,000 square foot space featuring cushioned, non-slip floor, glare-free lighting and the latest audio and visual equipment. It contains the Performance Studio, Hilda Willis Tap Studio, and three Dance Studios.

#### **Residence Halls**

The University's residence halls include Conestoga, Lawrence, Pioneer and Thayer, as well as the Boulevard Apartments.

Point Park University is recognized as a leader in the economic development of downtown Pittsburgh. Its students, faculty and staff contribute more than \$73 million annually to the regional economy. The University's residence halls comprise the largest residential complex in downtown Pittsburgh.

#### **Athletics**

Point Park University, which fields fifteen varsity sports teams, is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The teams include men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball and softball and men's baseball, all of which compete in the Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (KIAC).

Point Park's teams are known as the Pioneers.



# ADMISSIONS and FINANCIAL AID

# ADMISSIONS

Overall, applications for admissions to Point Park University increased from fall 2014 to fall 2015 (+1.80%). At the undergraduate level, fall 2015 applications increased by 40 or +0.80% (from 4,974 to 5,014) over the prior year. The largest increase in applications was found with the new full-time freshmen undergraduates (+3.53%) while the new accelerated undergraduates showed the largest decrease (-81.11%). It should be noted that applications for this category (accelerated undergraduates) has been dramatically reduced as part of an institutional plan, and by fall 2016, this category should be completely phased out. Point Park University has about a 75% acceptance rate for full-time freshmen (table 3.2). The fall 2015 acceptance rate for graduate programs is 64% (table 3.2).

Of all the 1,433 newly enrolled students, 61% (867) are female and 17% (247) are Black or African-American (table 3.6). The average age for full-time freshmen is 18 (table 3.7). For full-time transfers/readmits, the average age is 24 while the average age for new part-time undergraduates, accelerated undergraduates and graduate students is 32, 34 and 32, respectively; both online undergraduates and online graduates have an average age of 34 (table 3.7). Of all the new students, 79% (1,125) come from Pennsylvania (table 3.7).

The School of Arts & Sciences enrolls the majority of the new undergraduates at 39%; the School of Business enrolls 25%; the Conservatory of Performing Arts enrolls 23% of the new undergraduates while the School of Communication enrolls 14% (table 3.8).

The School of Arts & Sciences enrolls 53% of the new graduate students; the School of Business enrolls 35%; the School of Communication enrolls 5%; the Conservatory of Performing Arts enrolls 3% while the Center for Innovative Learning enrolls 4% of the new graduate students. ## Student Financial Aid

Table 3.10 shows undergraduates receiving financial aid has increased slightly (92% to 96%) over the last several fall semesters while graduates receiving financial aid has decreased (91% to 89%) from fall 2013 to fall 2014. The total amount of financial aid received by Point Park University's students in academic year 2014-2015 represents a 1% increase over academic year 2013-2014, from \$83,252,876 to \$84,052,511. And, the average award total increased 3% from \$20,986 to \$21,568 (table 3.11).

# ENROLLMENT

## ENROLLMENT

Enrollment increased over last year by +2.9% (from 3,737 to 3,844) (table 4.1). Of the 3,844 students enrolled, 83% (3,188 headcount) are undergraduate students and 17% (656 headcount) are graduate students (table 4.1).

Some other highlights include the fact that approximately 83% of undergraduate students are full-time, while only 39% of graduate students are full-time (table 4.3). The majority (76%) of Point Park's students come from Pennsylvania, (table 4.9). Also, the number of undergraduate students living on campus in student housing decreased slightly by -1.7%. There are now 1,014 undergraduate students living on campus as compared to 1,032 last year (table 4.10). This represents 32% of the entire undergraduate student body. Further, 77% of all full-time freshmen are living in campus housing. Point Park remains an ethnically diverse university and its international student population represents 43 different countries (table 4.18).

Overall, 68 percent (2,607 headcount) of our students are from Southwestern PA counties (fig. 4.15). Within each school, 81% of Business, 79% of Arts & Sciences, 70% of Communication, 33% of the Conservatory of Performing Arts, and 93% of the Center for Innovative Learning are from southwest PA (table 4.19). Southwest PA enrollment has decreased -6% compared to fall 2006 (table 4.20).

This section includes a glance at fall 2015 enrollment data, as well as a detailed account of student enrollment trends over the past five years by various demographic features. For clarification purposes, some enrollment definitions are listed below.

#### **Enrollment Definitions:**

*Student enrollment* in higher education is described in terms of both headcount and FTE (Full-time Equivalence).

*Student headcount* is the count of individual students whose administrative records indicate that they were registered in a credit-bearing course as of the university's enrollment census date for each semester.

Student FTE is calculated using two different methods:

 <u>Method 1</u>: Undergraduate FTE = FT headcount + (PT Credit Hours/15)


 Graduate FTE = FT headcount + (PT Credit Hours/10)

 <u>Method 2</u>: Undergraduate and Graduate FTE = FT headcount + (1/3 PT headcount)

*Full-time Status* - An individual student is classified as full-time if he or she maintains at least 12 undergraduate credits or 9 graduate credits.

 Table 4.1. Trends of Fall Headcount And FTE by Division




#### Fig. 4.1. Student Enrollment Trends 2011 through 2015





Fig. 4.3. Enrollment Trends by Course Load and Division





Fig. 4.5. Fall 2015 Enrollment By New Race/Ethnicity

Fig. 4.6. Enrollment by Minority Status For ALL Students






Fig 4.11. Enrollment Trends by Classification (all students)






Fig 4.12. Enrollment by Academic Departments and Degrees/Certificates, Fall '15




Fig. 4.14. Enrollment by Academic Department, Fall '15





# **RETENTION and GRADUATION RATES**


While the retention rate for first-time, full-time freshmen at Point Park University decreased slightly over last year from 77% to 73%, retention for other student population cohorts either remained the same or increased substantially (see Table 5.1). The biggest overall increase was seen with accelerated undergraduates (from 58% to 79%). It should be noted that enrollment for this category has been dramatically reduced as part of an institutional plan. By fall 2016, this category should be completely phased out.

A modest increase in first to second year retention was also experienced by new full-time undergraduate transfer students (from 77% to 80%). Increases from last year to this year can be found in most academic departments. The largest increase came from Communication (from 68% to 86%). This increase was followed closely by increases in the departments of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology, Humanities, and Dance (+15, +10, +10 percentage points, respectively). A larger than expected decrease occurred with new full-time transfers from the Education department (from 93% to 81%). It should be noted that this most recent retention rate for the Department of Education is still higher than the prior 4-year average of 75%.

First to second year retention remained relatively stable for new part-time undergraduates and new graduate students (55% and 79%, respectively). For the former, this cohort continues to be a difficult one to study due to the frequency with which they temporarily withdrawal (i.e., stop out). For the latter category of new graduate student retention, some sizeable increases were experienced in the departments of Education and Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology (+31 and +12 percentage points, respectively). Unfortunately, there were also decreases in retention for the departments of Humanities, Criminal Justice, Business, and Communication (- 26, -7, -5, -3 percentage points, respectively). As a side note, the newly added MFA in Screenwriting experienced a first to second year retention rate of 88% which is significantly higher than the overall retention rate for the graduate student population.

The six-year graduation rate for freshmen has remained at 58% (see table 5.9) while the four-year graduation rate decreased slightly (from 51% to 47%). The largest increases in six-year graduation rates were experienced by Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology and Humanities (+13 and +10 percentage points, respectively) while the largest decreases can be found in Education (from 68% to 54%), Business (from 55% to 49%) and Cinema Arts (from 74% to 68%).

Each year, the Office of Institutional Research and Planning prepares detailed retention reports on the various cohorts for analysis and decision-making. These reports show aggregated data by such variables as gender, race, age, on-campus/commuter, incoming high school grade point average, SAT/ACT scores and many other items. Some of this information is available in tables 5.10. through 5.16.




# Fig. 5.1. Overall Fall to Fall Retention Rates by Student Type

# ACADEMIC PROGRAMS AND DEGREES CONFERRED

## ACADEMIC PROGRAMS And DEGREES CONFERRED

Degrees and certificates awarded by Point Park University are authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. The university confers degrees at the Certificate, Associate, Baccalaureate, Masters and Doctorate levels.

The University offers a total of 114 degree programs of study. This includes 95 degrees at the undergraduate level, 17 masters programs and 2 doctorate degrees. For a detailed listing, please see table 6.5.


During the 2014-15 academic year Point Park granted 992 degrees. This number represents a 7% increase in degrees granted from the 2008-09 academic year.


Of the 992 degrees granted, 39% were awarded by the School of Business, 12% by the School of Communication, 17% by the Conservatory of Performing Arts, and within the School of Arts & Sciences, 9% by the Department of Criminal Justice and Intelligence Studies, 7% by the Department of Education, 6% by the Department of Humanities & Human Sciences, 7% by the Department of Literary Arts, and 9% by the Department of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology (table 6.2).

The degrees conferred data in this chapter shows the total number of degrees awarded within an academic year. An academic year in this context is defined as beginning July 1 and ending June 30. This definition is consistent with the Pennsylvania Department of Education's definition and methodology for reporting degrees awarded.




Fig. 6.2. Degrees Conferred by Academic Unit, Academic Year 2014-15

# FACULTY AND STAFF

## FACULTY AND STAFF

This chapter of the factbook pertains to full-time faculty and staff only. Part-time/adjunct faculty and staff are very transient populations, thus making it difficult to track and include in this chapter.

Overall, in fall 2015, there were 139 full-time faculty and 262 full-time staff. The total (401) represents a decrease of -34 full-time staff while full-time faculty decreased by -2 over the prior year. When compared to five years ago, Point Park has decreased the number of full-time faculty and staff by -4% (table 7.1)

Almost two-thirds (59%) of the full-time faculty are male while only 41% of the full-time staff are male, (table 7.2). Only 8% of both full-time faculty and staff are considered being part of a racial/ethnic minority (table 7.3). This is a slight decrease from 2014 where 9% of full-time faculty and staff were considered being part of a racial/ethnic minority. To see a more detailed breakdown of full-time faculty by academic department and gender/race, refer to table 7.4.

As shown in table 7.5, the median faculty salary decreased from 2014 to 2015 due to several factors. Primary among these was the early retirement of higher salaried faculty as evidenced in the lower number of overall faculty. In addition, several faculty members were promoted within the ranks, and newly hired faculty members were generally at the Assistant Professor and/or Instructor ranks. Also of note is that visiting professors' salaries are not included within the median salary section.

According to table 7.6, 62% of the full-time faculty are tenured in fall 2015 while another 24% are on tenure-track. The academic departments of Humanities and Human Sciences, Business, Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology, Communication and Literary Arts have the highest percentage of full-time faculty who are tenured (79%, 70%, 67%, 67% and 57%, respectively).

Table 7.7 shows that the mean years of service for professors is at 24 while the other ranks have substantially lower number of mean years of service.




Fig. 7.1. Full-time Faculty and Staff




Fig. 7.2. Full-time University Personnel by Gender, Fall 2015




Fig. 7.3. Full-time University Personnel by Race/Ethnicity, Fall 2015








#### Fig. 7.5. Tenure Status of Full-time Faculty, Fall 2015


## ENDOWMENT

### **ENDOWMENT**

Table 8.1 illustrates how the University's collective endowment has increased over the years. The total endowment consists of two collective fund groups. It includes both donor-restricted endowment funds (the "Endowment Fund") which are classified as either temporarily or permanently restricted funds, and non-donor unrestricted funds that have been established by the Board of Trustees to function as reserve-type funds (the "Board Designated Fund").
