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INTRODUCTION

Foreword from the Office of Institutional Research

Recognizing that information is a key institutional resource, The Office of Institutional Research is responsible for providing the university management with information that supports institutional planning, policy formation and decision making; for coordinating responses to inquiries for university-related information and serving as a comprehensive source for information about the institution. GENERAL INFORMATION

History of the University

Throughout its history, Point Park University has taken pride in its urban roots and contributions to the vitality of downtown Pittsburgh.

The University began as the Business Training College (BTC), which was founded in 1933 by Dr. Dorothy and L. Herbert Finkelhor as a proprietary school that prepared students for careers in the business world. BTC was located in downtown Pittsburgh.

In 1960, the state of Pennsylvania chartered BTC as Point Park Junior College, a tax-exempt institution of higher education. The College was re-chartered as Point Park College in 1966 and began awarding bachelor's degrees. Its first graduate program (journalism and communications) was established in 1981.

Point Park was granted university status by the Pennsylvania Department of Education in October 2003.

Point Park University acquired The Pittsburgh Playhouse (now Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse) in 1968. Its main campus remains in downtown Pittsburgh and includes more than 10 properties, including academic, administrative and residence halls.

To meet its growing needs, the University has acquired various downtown properties during the past several years. As one of the largest property owners in downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park's footprint extends down the Wood Street corridor from the Monongahela River to Forbes Avenue.

Approximately 4,000 students are enrolled at the University.

University Profile

Point Park University is a comprehensive master's level university with a strong liberal arts tradition, and is located in the heart of downtown Pittsburgh. Point Park enrolls approximately 4,000 full and part-time students in more than 90 majors and concentrations offered through its four schools. Its students represent 45 states and 31 countries.

Point Park offers bachelor's and associate's degrees in a number of majors, including accounting, advertising/public relations, applied arts, applied history, behavioral sciences, biological sciences, biotechnology, broadcasting, business, business management, cinema and digital arts, civil engineering technology, criminal justice, dance (with concentrations in ballet, modern and jazz), dance pedagogy, digital media, economics and finance, early childhood education, elementary education, elementary education (with concentration in theatre arts), English, English/creative writing, environmental health science and protection, electrical engineering technology, forensic science, global cultural studies, health services, human resources management, information technology, instructional studies, integrated marketing communications, intelligence and national security, interdisciplinary studies, journalism and mass communication, law enforcement, leadership and public service, legal studies, liberal studies, management services, mechanical engineering technology, organizational leadership, photography, photojournalism, political science, psychology, public administration, screenwriting, secondary education (biological science, citizenship, English, mass communication, mathematics), specialized professional studies/funeral services, sport, arts and entertainment management, theater arts (with concentrations in acting, musical theater, stage management, technical theater/design).

The University has earned national distinction in a number of fields, including dance, theater, journalism and mass communication, and sport, arts and entertainment management.

The University also awards eleven graduate degrees: the master of arts degree includes the following majors: curriculum and instruction, educational administration, journalism and mass communication, organizational leadership; the master of education degree includes: secondary certification, teaching and leadership; the master of fine arts in theater arts; the master of business administration degree; and the master of science degree includes: criminal justice, environmental studies and engineering management.

Learning is an interactive process at Point Park where the average class size is between 15-20 students.

University facilities include engineering technology, science and computer labs; a television studio; photo labs; the Program for Academic Success; dance studios; and a radio station. Performing arts majors gain practical experience at Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse.

In recent years the University has embarked upon a major renovation of its facilities, including new loft-style apartments for upperclassmen, new science labs, a state-of-the-art color television studio, and digital film editing suites. It has also upgraded classrooms, the residence halls, dining facilities, and the overall physical plant. The addition of F. Tracy Henderson Alumni Park and the Academic Hall Atrium has brightened the campus while providing students with more places for study and relaxation.

In fall 2009 the University completed a \$6.8 million second-phase conversion of 312-322 Boulevard of the Allies to the contemporary Boulevard Apartments for Point Park University upperclassmen. This phase provides an additional 100 beds. The final \$4.7 million phase of housing for this project will be completed for fall 2010 with an additional 80 beds bringing the total number of beds to 274.

Point Park University is an institution that utilizes green principles as it renovates. The University's \$16 million dance complex, which opened in August 2007, was awarded Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design or LEED Gold, one of the highest levels of certification in the U.S. Green Building Council's building performance program. The complex is the first of its kind to receive LEED-NC Gold for new construction, according to USGBC statistics.

The dance complex is a 44,000 square foot space featuring cushioned, non-slip floor, glare-free lighting and the latest audio and visual equipment. It contains the George Rowland White Performance Studio, Hilda Willis Tap Studio, and the George Rowland White Dance Studios One, Two and Three.

The University's residence halls include Conestoga, Lawrence, Pioneer and Thayer, as well as the Boulevard Apartments.

Point Park University is recognized as a leader in the economic development of downtown Pittsburgh. Its students, faculty and staff contribute more than \$73 million annually to the regional economy. The University's residence halls comprise the largest residential complex in downtown Pittsburgh.

Point Park is continually seeking ways to empower the region by partnering with various community organizations. Partnerships include the McGinnis Guest Artist Series, which provides students and the Pittsburgh community the opportunity to engage with distinguished artists in dance and theater.

Athletics

Point Park University, which fields eleven varsity sports teams, is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The teams include men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, softball and baseball, all of which compete in the American Mideast Conference, the NAIA's largest.

Point Park's teams are known as the Pioneers.



ADMISSIONS and FINANCIAL AID

ADMISSIONS

Overall, applications for admissions to Point Park University decreased slightly from fall 2008 to fall 2009 (-1.03%). At the undergraduate level, fall 2009 applications decreased by 3.15% (from 4,818 to 4,666) over the prior year. The largest increase in applications was found with new graduates which demonstrated a 19.52% increase in applications from the prior year. Point Park University has about a 78% acceptance rate for full-time freshmen (table 3.2). The fall 2009 acceptance rate for graduate programs is 70% (see table 3.2).

59% of all new students are female and 23% are African-American (table 3.6). The average age for full-time freshmen is 18 (table 3.6). For full-time transfers/readmits, the average age is 23 while the average age for new part-time undergraduates, accelerated undergraduates and graduate students is 31 to 33 (table 3.6). Of the newly enrolled students, 84% come from Pennsylvania.

The School of Arts & Sciences enrolls the majority of the new undergraduates (40%); this school includes the following departments: Criminal Justice and Intelligence Studies, Education, Humanities, Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology, and Undecided. The Conservatory of Performing Arts (Cinema and Digital Arts, Dance, and Theatre) enrolls 22% of the new undergraduates while the School of Business enrolls 23%. The newly formed School of Communication (previously the department of J/MC within the School of Arts & Sciences) enrolls 15% of the new undergraduates.

The School of Business enrolls 68% of the new graduate students; the School of Arts & Sciences enrolls 26% while the School of Communication enrolls 6% of the new graduate students. More detailed information of fall 2009 admissions data can be found on the following pages.

Table 3.9 shows undergraduates receiving financial aid has remained consistently around 90% over the last several fall semesters while graduates receiving financial aid has decreased (78% to 67%) from fall 2007 to fall 2008. The total amount of financial aid received by Point Park University's students in academic year 2008-2009 represents a 16% increase over academic year 2007-2008, from \$59,851,637 to \$69,360,337. The average award total increased from \$15,121 to \$17,305 (table 3.10).

ENROLLMENT

Enrollment increased over last year by 4% (from 3,846 to 3,986) (table 4.1). Of the 3,986 students enrolled, 85% (3,407 headcount) are undergraduate students and 15% (579 headcount) are graduate students (table 4.1).

Some other highlights include the fact that the majority of Point Park's students come from Pennsylvania, 84% (table 4.8). Approximately, 76% of undergraduate students are full-time, while only 40% of graduate students are full-time (table 4.2). Point Park remains an ethnically diverse university and its international student population represents 29 different countries (table 4.13). Also, the number of students living on campus in student housing continues to rise. There are now 868 undergraduate students living on campus as compared to 807 last year (table 4.9). This represents 25% of the entire undergraduate student body. 75% of all full-time freshmen are living in campus housing.

Overall, 77 percent (3,063 headcount) of our students are from Southwestern PA counties (fig. 4.23, page 42). Within each school, 90% of Arts & Sciences, 92% of Business, 75% of Communication, and 34% of the Conservatory of Performing Arts are from southwest PA (table 4.14). From fall 2008 to fall 2009 the biggest increases in enrollment occurred in Allegheny and Armstrong counties while the biggest decreases occurred in Butler, Fayette and Indiana (fig. 4.24, page 45). Southwest PA enrollment has increased 32% since fall 2000 (table 4.15).

This section includes a glance at fall 2009 enrollment data, as well as a detailed account of student enrollment trends over the past five years by various demographic features. For clarification purposes, some enrollment definitions are listed below.

Enrollment Definitions:

Student enrollment in higher education is described in terms of both headcount and FTE (Full-time Equivalence).

Student headcount is the count of individual students whose administrative records indicate that they were registered in a credit-bearing course as of the university's enrollment census date for each semester.

Student FTE is calculated by dividing students' total credit hours by a nationally accepted full-time credit load. The divisor is 15 for undergraduate and 10 for graduate students. Student FTE is calculated each semester.

An individual student is classified as full-time if he or she maintains at least 12 undergraduate credits or 9 graduate credits.

Fig. 4.1. Undergraduate Enrollment by Ethnicity, Fall '09





Fig. 4.2. Undergraduate Enrollment by Residency, Fall '09

Fig. 4.3. Undergraduate Enrollment by Gender, Fall '09








Fig. 4.5. Undergraduate Enrollment by Age, Fall '09




Fig. 4.7. Graduate Enrollment by Residency, Fall '09




Fig. 4.8. Graduate Enrollment by Gender, Fall '09




Fig. 4.9. Graduate Enrollment by Course Load, Fall '09





Fig. 4.10. Graduate Enrollment by Age, Fall '09








Fig. 4.11. Enrollment by Academic School, Fall '09










Fig. 4.14. Enrollment Trends by Student Type

Fig. 4.15. Enrollment Trends by Gender (all students)






Fig. 4.16. Enrollment By Ethnicity comparing Fall 2005 to Fall 2009

Fig. 4.17. Enrollment by Minority Status For ALL Students



Fig. 4.18. Enrollment by Age, Comparing Fall 2005 to Fall 2009



Fig. 4.19. Average Age Between Fall 2005 and Fall 2009



Fig. 4.20. Enrollment Trends By Residency



Fig. 4.21. Undergraduate Students in Residence Halls







Fig. 4.23. FALL 2009 Enrollment - with a focus on Southwestern Pennsylvania Counties




Fig. 4.24. NET CHANGE in Enrollment between Fall 2008 and Fall 2009, with a focus on SouthWestern PA Counties

RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

RETENTION and GRADUATION RATES

Over the years, retention and graduation rates for first-time, full-time freshmen at Point Park University have remained relatively stable. However, the most recent statistics show some dramatic increases as compared to prior years. For instance, retention for first-time, full-time freshmen has increased from 71% last year to 77% this year (table 5.1, fig. 5.1). The largest increases were found in Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology (from 50% to 71%), Humanities and Human Sciences (from 50% to 67%) and Communication (from 63% to 76%). See table 5.2.

For new part-time undergraduates, the retention rate for the 2008 cohort was the same as it was for the fall 2007 cohort (59%). As it's been noted in the past, this population is more difficult to study due to the frequency with which they tend to leave the institution temporarily (see table 5.3).

According to table 5.4, retention rates for the accelerated undergraduate programs have dropped from 77% last year to 68% this year. The biggest decreases occurred in the Dept. of Criminal Justice and Intelligence Studies (from 72% to 60%) and in the School of Business (from 79% to 68%). This is somewhat surprising since we expect to see higher retention for students enrolled in the cohort model than those in non-cohort programs. Not only has this been the case at Point Park University in the past, but it is further supported by research at other institutions.

Overall, full-time transfer undergraduate retention dropped slightly from 80% to 78%. The biggest decrease occurred in Business where retention dropped from 83% to 69%. However, transfers from the School of Arts & Sciences increased from 74% to 80%. See table 5.5.

New graduate student retention dropped slightly from 80% to 76% (see table 5.6). The biggest decrease occurred with the Masters in Journalism and Mass Communication where retention dropped from 81% for the fall 2007 cohort to 59% for the fall 2008 cohort. Retention for new graduate students in the School of Business remained the same as last year (80%) while Arts & Sciences experienced a slight increase from last year (70% to 74%).

Typically, graduation rates are reported for first-time, full-time freshmen. Most recent data shows Point Park as having a 53% six-year graduation rate for the fall 2003 cohort of first-time, full-time freshmen (table 5.7). This represents the highest graduation rate experienced by Point Park in recent years.

While graduation rates for Arts & Sciences and Business have stayed the same (46% and 54%, respectively), the Conservatory has increased from 51% for the fall 2002 cohort to 58% for the fall 2003 cohort. The School of Communication has increased their six-year graduation rate from 43% to 52%. It should be noted that the "undecided" majors are included as part of the cohort regardless of whether they go into an academic program or not. Their six-year graduation rate is 34% (down from 35% for the fall 2002 cohort). See table 5.7.

Each year, the Office of Institutional Research prepares detailed retention reports for the various cohorts on a number of variables. Most recently, findings show that Point Park has retained 81% of the freshmen who lived in the campus residence halls, whereas only 65% of the freshman commuters were retained (table 5.8).

According to Table 5.9, those freshmen awarded the Presidential Scholarship continue to be retained at very high rates (92% for the fall 2008 cohort), while only 76% of those not awarded the Presidential Scholarship were retained from fall 2008 to fall 2009.

More detailed information regarding one-year persistence for the 2008 cohort is available in Tables 5.10 through 5.15. These tables show retention by race, gender and age.

Fig. 5.1. Overall Fall to Fall Retention Rates by Student Type



ACADEMIC PROGRAMS And DEGREES CONFERRED

Degrees and certificates awarded by Point Park University are authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. The university confers degrees at the Certificate, Associate, Baccalaureate and Masters levels.

The University offers a total of 96 degree programs of study. This includes 83 degrees at the undergraduate level and 13 graduate programs. For a detailed listing, please see table 6.5.

As Point Park's student enrollment reaches historical highs, so has the number of degrees granted by Point Park. During the 2008-09 academic year, Point Park granted 930 degrees, this number represents an overall increase of 27% from the 2002-03 academic year.

Of the 930 degrees granted, 39% were awarded by the School of Business, 13% by the School of Communication, 18% by the Conservatory of Performing Arts, and within the School of Arts & Sciences, 14% by the Department of Criminal Justice and Intelligence Studies, 6% by the Department of Education, 6% by the Department of Humanities, and 6% by the Department of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology (table 6.2).

Degrees conferred falling within the date-range of July 1 through June 30 determines an academic year.

Fig. 6.1. Degrees Conferred Trends



Fig. 6.2. Degrees Conferred by Academic Unit, Academic Year 2008-09



FACULTY AND STAFF

This chapter of the factbook pertains to full-time faculty and staff only. Part-time/adjunct faculty and staff are very transient populations, thus making it difficult to track and include in this chapter.

Overall, in fall 2009, there were 119 full-time faculty and 301 full-time staff. The total (420) is nearly a 6% increase in the total number of full-time faculty and staff from the prior year (398). When compared to five years ago, Point Park has increased the number of full-time faculty and staff by 41% (table 7.1)

Almost two-thirds (61%) of the full-time faculty are male while only 38% of the full-time staff are male. (table 7.2) Only 6% of both full-time faculty and staff are considered being part of a racial/ethnic minority (table 7.3). This is consistent to fall 2008 data when only 7% of the full-time faculty and staff were considered part of a racial/ethnic minority. To see a more detailed breakdown of full-time faculty by academic department and gender/race, refer to table 7.4.

Prior to this year, average faculty salaries have increased steadily over the years for all faculty ranks (table 7.5) with the most significant increase occurring in the rank of 'professor' where salaries increased 10% from fall 2007 to fall 2008 (\$75,169 and \$82,737 respectively). Unfortunately, due to the adverse economic conditions in 2009, average faculty salaries in 2009-10 have remained close to the same levels as 2008-09.

According to table 7.6, 48% of the full-time faculty are tenured in fall 2009 while another 41% are on tenure-track. The academic departments of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology, Education, and Business have the highest percentage of full-time faculty who are tenured (73%, 57%, and 52%, respectively).

Table 7.7 shows that the mean years of service for professors is nearly 26 while the other ranks have substantially lower number of mean years of service.

Fig. 7.1. Full-time Faculty and Staff



Fig. 7.5. Tenure Status of Full-time Faculty, Fall 2009




BUDGET

BUDGET

The following schedules summarize the University's budget and results of operations for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2009. The budget is approved annually by the Board of Trustees. This section also highlights the University's trended historical endowment balances at the end of each respective fiscal year. The final schedule details the primary sources of revenue for the University, tuition and fees, and also reflects the historical trend of those costs.

The University relies primarily on revenue generated from tuition and fees. As illustrated in table 8.1, total tuition and fees represent 82.1% of revenue. The majority of auxiliary enterprise revenue is derived from room and board fees.

The University's operating budget (table 8.2) summarizes the primary expenditure categories. As illustrated, the largest category of Instruction and General Institutional Support directly funds the mission of educating students at Point Park. The second largest expenditure category, Student Aid, supports the fact that most Point Park students receive some form of internal financial assistance.

Table 8.3 illustrates how the University's collective endowment has increased over the years. The total endowment consists of two collective fund groups. It includes both donor-restricted endowment funds (the "Endowment Fund") which are classified as either temporarily or permanently restricted funds, and non-donor unrestricted funds that have been established by the Board of Trustees to function as reserve-type funds (the "Board Designated Fund").




Fig. 8.4. Annual Undergraduate Tuition/Fees and Room & Board

Table 8.4 and figure 8.4 provide additional trended historical information for the University's tuition, fee, and room and board rates. As stated above, these rates are approved annually by the Board of Trustees as part of the annual budget process.

Fig. 8.1. Total University Budget - Revenue, Fiscal Year 2009



Fig. 8.2. Total University Budget - Expenditures, Fiscal Year 2009



Fig. 8.3. Total Endowment Over Five Years


