Foreword from the Office of Institutional Research

Recognizing that information is a key institutional resource, The Office of Institutional Research is responsible for providing the university management with information that supports institutional planning, policy formation and decision making; for coordinating responses to inquiries for university-related information and serving as a comprehensive source for information about the institution. To that end, the purpose of this factbook is to provide accurate and timely information about significant aspects of the university and its operations. The 2010-11 Factbook is the sixth annual comprehensive report of data and information collected at Point Park University. It includes the most current information available for an academic or fiscal year, as well as pertinent historical information. New data added to this edition include an executive level organization chart (page iii), information about the Academic Village at Point Park University (page 3), more detailed enrollment reports (pages 43 and 63), and an important notice about the reporting of newly mandated race/ethnicity codes (page 26). In addition, for those chapters where data is aggregated by school and department, the School of Business now follows a departmental structure. Specifically, the School of Business is now comprised of the Department of Accounting, Economics & Finance, Information Technology, the Department of Management, and the Department of Global Management & Organization.

Most of the information contained in the factbook is extracted from administrative reports produced on an annual basis by various university offices. The expert assistance and cooperation received from individuals in offices supplying factbook data is sincerely appreciated.

University Organization


Point Park University is organized into two operational divisions: The Office of Academic and Student Affairs and the Office of Finance and Operations. Each division is led by a senior vice president who reports to the president, Dr. Paul Hennigan.

The Office of Academic and Student Affairs includes all academic programs, faculty and academic support staff, as well as the Office of Students Affairs, the Office of the Registrar, and the Library. This division is led by Dr. Karen S. McIntyre, the Senior Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, Chief Academic Officer and Dean of Faculty.

The Office of Finance and Operations includes the Office of Human Resources, the Office of Business Services, the Office of Finance, Information Technology Services, the Office of Institutional Research, Operations, which includes facilities, security, safety, transportation and conferences/events, and the University Architect/Planner. division is led by Bridget Mancosh, the Senior Vice President for Finance and Operations.

Other key functions that report directly to the President include: Development and Alumni Affairs, led by Vice President, Rick Haskins; External Affairs, including Marketing and Communications, led by Vice President, Mariann Geyer; and Strategic Planning and Enrollment, including Admissions, Graduate and Adult Enrollment, and International Student Services and Enrollment, led by Assistant Vice President, Trudy Williams.

History of the University

Throughout its history, Point Park University has taken pride in its urban roots and contributions to the vitality of downtown Pittsburgh.

The University began as the Business Training College (BTC), which was founded in 1933 by Dr. Dorothy and L. Herbert Finkelhor as a proprietary school that prepared students for careers in the business world. BTC was located in downtown Pittsburgh.

In 1960, the state of Pennsylvania chartered BTC as Point Park Junior College, a tax-exempt institution of higher education. The College was re-chartered as Point Park College in 1966 and began awarding bachelor's degrees. Its first graduate program (journalism and communications) was established in 1981.

Point Park was granted university status by the Pennsylvania Department of Education in October 2003.

Point Park University acquired The Pittsburgh Playhouse (now Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse) in 1968. Its main campus remains in downtown Pittsburgh and includes more than 15 properties, including academic, administrative and residence halls.

To meet its growing needs, the University has acquired various downtown properties during the past several years. As one of the largest property owners in downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park's footprint extends down the Wood Street corridor from the Monongahela River to Forbes Avenue.

Approximately 4,000 students are enrolled at the University.

University Profile

Located in Downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park University is a comprehensive master's level university with a strong liberal arts tradition. Point Park enrolls approximately 4,000 full and part-time students in more than 90 majors and concentrations offered through its four schools. Its students represent 44 states and 34 countries.

Point Park offers bachelor's and associate's degrees in a number of majors, including accounting, advertising, allied health, applied arts, applied history, behavioral sciences, biological sciences, biotechnology, broadcast reporting, business, business management, cinema production, civil engineering technology, criminal justice, dance (with concentrations in ballet, modern and jazz), dance pedagogy, digital arts, economics and finance, early childhood education (transfer students only), education (pre-K-4th grade), education (4th-8th grade), elementary education (transfer students only), elementary education (with concentration in theatre arts), English, English/creative writing, environmental health science and protection, electrical engineering technology, forensic science, global cultural studies, health services, human resources management, information technology, instructional studies, integrated marketing communications, intelligence and national security, interdisciplinary studies, journalism, law enforcement, leadership and public service, legal studies, liberal studies, management services, mass communication, mechanical engineering technology, multimedia, organizational leadership, photography, photojournalism, political science, psychology, public administration, public relations, radio-TV (production and programming), screenwriting, secondary education (biological science, citizenship, English, mass communication, mathematics), funeral service, sport, arts and entertainment management, theater arts (with concentrations in acting, musical theater, stage management, technical theater/design).

The University has earned national distinction in a number of fields, including dance, theater, journalism and mass communication, and sport, arts and entertainment management.

The University also awards eleven graduate degrees: the master of arts degree includes the following majors: curriculum and instruction, educational administration, journalism and mass communication, organizational leadership; the master of education degree includes: secondary certification, teaching and leadership; the master of fine arts in acting; the master of business administration degree; and the master of science degree includes: criminal justice, engineering management and environmental studies.

Learning is an interactive process at Point Park where the average class size is between 15-20 students.

University facilities include engineering technology, science and computer labs; a television studio; photo labs; dance studios; and a radio station. Performing arts majors gain practical experience at Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse.

In recent years, the University launched the Academic Village at Point Park University, a multiblock living and learning hub that is transforming the University campus and the Downtown neighborhood it inhabits. It is redefining the student experience, campus life and Point Park's connection to the community.

As part of the Academic Village, expect to see:

- Students, city residents and businesspeople interact in a new green urban park
- World-class speakers, spirited performances, and athletic activities inform and delight students in a new Student and Convocation Center
- 40,000 theatergoers attend performances at the Pittsburgh Playhouse, soon-to-be located in the heart of Downtown Pittsburgh
- A green roof and other environmentally friendly building techniques create sustainable additions to a revitalized Downtown district and campus
- The energy and vitality of the 24/7 Academic Village pulse across Downtown neighborhoods and unite the Market Square and Cultural Districts

Phase I – Central Campus Development Project

Point Park's vision is to be one of the most dynamic private, urban universities in America. The vision begins with facilities that give students, faculty, and staff the environment they need to excel. Increasing enrollment, now and in the future, will not only create the expansion needed to fulfill this vision, but also animate the new campus with diversity, creativity, and vibrancy.

Phase II – Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse

In 1968, Point Park breathed new life into the Pittsburgh Playhouse by converting it into the University's performing arts center. Now, Point Park will reinvigorate the Pittsburgh arts scene once again with the construction of a new Pittsburgh Playhouse on Forbes Avenue in Downtown Pittsburgh.

Point Park University is an institution that utilizes green principles as it renovates. The University's \$16 million dance complex, which opened in August 2007, was awarded Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design or LEED Gold, one of the highest levels of certification in the U.S. Green Building Council's building performance program. The complex is the first of its kind to receive LEED-NC Gold for new construction, according to USGBC statistics.

The dance complex is a 44,000 square foot space featuring cushioned, non-slip floor, glare-free lighting and the latest audio and visual equipment. It contains the George Rowland White Performance Studio, Hilda Willis Tap Studio, and the George Rowland White Dance Studios Two, Three and Four.

The University's residence halls include Conestoga, Lawrence, Pioneer and Thayer, as well as the Boulevard Apartments.

Point Park University is recognized as a leader in the economic development of downtown Pittsburgh. Its students, faculty and staff contribute more than \$73 million annually to the regional economy. The University's residence halls comprise the largest residential complex in downtown Pittsburgh.

Athletics

Point Park University, which fields eleven varsity sports teams, is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The teams include men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, softball and baseball, all of which compete in the American Mideast Conference, the NAIA's largest.

Point Park's teams are known as the Pioneers.



ADMISSIONS and FINANCIAL AID

ADMISSIONS

Overall, applications for admissions to Point Park University increased slightly from fall 2009 to fall 2010 (0.91%). At the undergraduate level, fall 2010 applications increased by 0.96% (from 4,666 to 4,711) over the prior year. The largest increase in applications was found with new full-time freshmen which demonstrated a 5.88% increase in applications from the prior year. Point Park University has about a 74% acceptance rate for full-time freshmen (table 3.2). The fall 2010 acceptance rate for graduate programs is 70% (table 3.2).

Of all the 1,452 newly enrolled students, 62% (907) are female and 20% (288) are Black or African-American (table 3.6). The average age for full-time freshmen is 18 (table 3.7). For full-time transfers/readmits, the average age is 23 while the average age for new part-time undergraduates, accelerated undergraduates and graduate students is 34, 32 and 30, respectively (table 3.7). Of all the new students, 80% (1,160) come from Pennsylvania (table 3.7).

The School of Arts & Sciences enrolls the majority of the new undergraduates at 44%; the Conservatory of Performing Arts enrolls 24%; the School of Business enrolls 18% of the new undergraduates while the School of Communication enrolls 15% (table 3.8).

The School of Business enrolls 64% of the new graduate students; the School of Arts & Sciences enrolls 23% while the School of Communication enrolls 12% of the new graduate students. More detailed information of fall 2010 admissions data can be found on the following pages.

Student Financial Aid

Table 3.10 shows undergraduates receiving financial aid has remained consistently around 90% over the last several fall semesters while graduates receiving financial aid has increased (67% to 71%) from fall 2008 to fall 2009. The total amount of financial aid received by Point Park University's students in academic year 2009-2010 represents an 8% increase over academic year 2008-2009, from \$69,360,337 to \$74,588,666. The average award total increased from \$17,305 to \$17,419 (table 3.11).

ENROLLMENT

Enrollment increased over last year by 2% (from 3,986 to 4,077) (table 4.2). Of the 4,077 students enrolled, 86% (3,493 headcount) are undergraduate students and 14% (584 headcount) are graduate students (table 4.2).

Some other highlights include the fact that approximately 76% of undergraduate students are full-time, while only 36% of graduate students are full-time (table 4.3). The majority (83%) of Point Park's students come from Pennsylvania, (table 4.10). Also, the number of students living on campus in student housing continues to rise. There are now 983 undergraduate students living on campus as compared to 868 last year (table 4.11). This represents 28% of the entire undergraduate student body. Further, 83% of all full-time freshmen are living in campus housing. Point Park remains an ethnically diverse university and its international student population represents 33 different countries (table 4.17).

Overall, 76 percent (3,092 headcount) of our students are from Southwestern PA counties (fig. 4.24). Within each school, 91% of Business, 89% of Arts & Sciences, 71% of Communication, and 35% of the Conservatory of Performing Arts are from southwest PA (table 4.18). From fall 2009 to fall 2010 the biggest increases in enrollment occurred in Westmoreland and Lawrence counties while the biggest decreases occurred in Butler and Allegheny (fig. 4.25). Southwest PA enrollment has increased 28% since fall 2001 (table 4.19).

This section includes a glance at fall 2010 enrollment data, as well as a detailed account of student enrollment trends over the past five years by various demographic features. For clarification purposes, some enrollment definitions are listed below.

Enrollment Definitions:

Student enrollment in higher education is described in terms of both headcount and FTE (Full-time Equivalence).

Student headcount is the count of individual students whose administrative records indicate that they were registered in a credit-bearing course as of the university's enrollment census date for each semester.

Student FTE is calculated by dividing students' total credit hours by a nationally accepted full-time credit load. The divisor is 15 for undergraduate and 10 for graduate students. Student FTE is calculated each semester.

An individual student is classified as full-time if he or she maintains at least 12 undergraduate credits or 9 graduate credits.

Fig. 4.1. Undergraduate Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity, Fall '10





Fig. 4.2. Undergraduate Enrollment by Residency, Fall '10

Fig. 4.3. Undergraduate Enrollment by Gender, Fall '10









Fig. 4.5. Undergraduate Enrollment by Age, Fall '10




Fig. 4.7. Graduate Enrollment by Residency, Fall '10




Fig. 4.8. Graduate Enrollment by Gender, Fall '10




Fig. 4.9. Graduate Enrollment by Course Load, Fall '10




Fig. 4.10. Graduate Enrollment by Age, Fall '10




Fig. 4.11. Enrollment by Academic School, Fall '10






Fig. 4.12. Enrollment by Academic Department, Fall '10







Fig. 4.14. Enrollment Trends by Student Type

An important note about recent changes to race and ethnicity coding

The U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) determined in 1997 that new race and ethnicity codes would be implemented for collecting all data reported to the federal government. They stated that these new codes allow data on ethnicity and race to reflect the growing diversity of our nation.

In 2007, the U.S. Department of Education posted to the Federal Register the "<u>Final Guidance on Maintaining, Collecting, and Reporting Racial and Ethnic Data to the U.S. Department of Education</u>" to implement OMB's 1997 Standards. The guidance issued by the Department covers two issues: 1) the collection of race and ethnicity data by institutions, and 2) the reporting of aggregate data to the Department.

Point Park University, in compliance with the Federal mandate, will now report race and ethnicity data that reflects students' ability to differentiate between race and ethnicity, as well as choose more than one race.


Thus, Point Park University will report the following new categories in all publically available periodic reports starting in the fall 2010 semester in order to be consistent with the proposed "single field" race/ethnicity codes:

- 1. American Indian/Alaska Native
- 2. Asian
- 3. Black or African American
- 4. Hispanic of any race
- 5. Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander
- 6. Non-resident Alien
- 7. White
- 8. Two or more races
- 9. Unknown

Since these new codes differ significantly from the old method of collecting and reporting race/ethnicity data, it is necessary to revise the tables in the most recent factbook that reflects this change in methodology. Since it is nearly impossible to match old race/ethnicity codes with the new ones, trend data prior to 2010 will remain in the old reporting format. Beginning with the Fall 2010 semester, all data pertaining to race/ethnicity will show the new codes. Unfortunately, this means that direct comparisons of race/ethnicity between 2010 and any semester prior to 2010 will be difficult at best.

Fig. 4.17. Enrollment By Race/Ethnicity comparing Fall 2005 to Fall 2009



Fig. 4.18. Enrollment by Minority Status For ALL Students



Fig. 4.19. Enrollment by Age, Comparing Fall 2006 to Fall 2010



Fig. 4.20. Average Age Between Fall 2006 and Fall 2010



Fig. 4.21. Enrollment Trends By Residency



Fig. 4.22. Undergraduate Students in Residence Halls







Fig. 4.24. FALL 2010 Enrollment - with a focus on Southwestern Pennsylvania Counties




Fig. 4.25. NET CHANGE in Enrollment between Fall 2009 and Fall 2010, with a focus on SouthWestern PA Counties

RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

RETENTION and GRADUATION RATES

Over the years, retention and graduation rates for first-time, full-time freshmen at Point Park University have remained relatively stable. However, last year, Point Park University experienced its highest freshman to sophomore retention rate in approximately 15 years (77%). This year, the freshman to sophomore retention rate remained at (77%), (table 5.1, fig. 5.1).

Although the overall retention rate is the same as last year, upon closer inspection of the data, the rates for most of the schools and departments actually decreased from last year to this year. The biggest decreases occurred in Humanities (67% to 56%), Criminal Justice & Intelligence Studies (92% to 86%) and the School of Business (79% to 73%). The Department of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology experienced a sizeable increase in their retention rate (71% to 79%). Overall, the Conservatory of Performing Arts increased slightly (82% to 83%). However, the Department of Dance decreased somewhat (82% to 80%) while the retention rates for Cinema & Digital Arts and Theatre increased (84% to 86% and 82% to 85%, respectively).

The most significant change from last year's retention rate to this year's rate occurred with the "<u>undecided</u>" full-time freshmen. Specifically, the freshman to sophomore retention rate for this population jumped to 77%. Prior to this, the average retention rate for "undecided" full-time freshmen was approximately 56%. The University had made a purposeful decision to focus on the "undecided" majors over the last few years. The data suggests that the strategies implemented to improve the retention of these students were effective, (table 5.2).

Overall, part-time undergraduate retention increased moderately from last year to this year (59% to 63%). It continues to be a difficult cohort to study due to the frequency with which they temporarily withdrawal. However, one significant finding shows an overall increase for the School of Arts & Sciences (55% to 64%). In particular, the Department of Education increased from 47% to 80%, (table 5.3).

Last year, Point Park experienced lower than normal retention for new accelerated undergraduate students (68% overall). It was especially low in Criminal Justice (60%). After careful analysis, University administration implemented strategies to improve the retention of this category overall and in this department in particular. This year, the retention rate for accelerated undergraduates increased to 77%. Further, the largest increase in retention for this category was found in Criminal Justice (from 60% to 86%).

Overall, full-time transfer undergraduate retention dropped from 78% to 70%. However, there was a significant increase with "undecided" transfer students even though the number of students in that entering cohort is small (n=11). The Department of Humanities also increased their transfer undergraduate retention from 68% to 88% while the remaining departments in the Arts & Sciences experienced decreases, (table 5.5).

New graduate student retention increased slightly from 76% to 79% for the entire University. The biggest increase occurred with the Masters in Journalism and Mass Communication where retention increased from 59% for the Fall 2008 cohort to 71% for the Fall 2009 cohort, (table 5.6).

Typically, graduation rates are reported for first-time, full-time freshmen. Most recent data shows Point Park as having a 48% six-year graduation rate for the fall 2004 cohort of first-time, full-time freshmen (table 5.7). That's a decrease of five percentage points from the Fall 2003 cohort (53%). However, it still marks higher than average graduation rates from prior years (46% four-year average for the Fall 1999 through Fall 2002 cohorts).

The School of Communication saw the only increase over last year (52% to 53%). The largest decrease occurred in the Arts & Sciences (46% to 36%). The graduation rates for the Conservatory and Business have stayed approximately the same as last year (55% to 52%, respectively). "Undecided" majors are included as part of the cohort regardless of whether they go into an academic program or not. Their six-year graduation rate is 21% (down from 34% for the Fall 2003 cohort). It should also be noted that three students from this entering cohort are still enrolled as of Fall 2010.

Each year, the Office of Institutional Research prepares detailed retention reports on the various cohorts for analysis and decision-making. These reports show aggregated data by such variables as gender, race, age, on-campus/commuter, incoming high school grade point average, SAT/ACT scores and many other items. Some of this information is available in Tables 5.8 through 5.14.

Fig. 5.1. Overall Fall to Fall Retention Rates by Student Type



ACADEMIC PROGRAMS AND DEGREES CONFERRED

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS And DEGREES CONFERRED

Degrees and certificates awarded by Point Park University are authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. The university confers degrees at the Certificate, Associate, Baccalaureate and Masters levels.

The University offers a total of 112 degree programs of study. This includes 101 degrees at the undergraduate level and 11 graduate programs. For a detailed listing, please see table 6.5.

As Point Park's student enrollment reaches historical highs, so has the number of degrees granted by Point Park. During the 2009-10 academic year, Point Park granted 909 degrees, this number represents an overall increase of 20% from the 2003-04 academic year.

Of the 909 degrees granted, 40% were awarded by the School of Business, 13% by the School of Communication, 16% by the Conservatory of Performing Arts, and within the School of Arts & Sciences, 12% by the Department of Criminal Justice and Intelligence Studies, 7% by the Department of Education, 5% by the Department of Humanities & Human Sciences, and 8% by the Department of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology (table 6.2).

The degrees conferred data in this chapter shows the total number of degrees awarded within an academic year. An academic year in this context is defined as beginning July 1 and ending June 30. This definition is consistent with the Pennsylvania Department of Education's definition and methodology for reporting degrees awarded.

Fig. 6.1. Degrees Conferred Trends



FACULTY AND STAFF

FACULTY AND STAFF

This chapter of the factbook pertains to full-time faculty and staff only. Part-time/adjunct faculty and staff are very transient populations, thus making it difficult to track and include in this chapter.

Overall, in fall 2010, there were 125 full-time faculty and 293 full-time staff. The total (418) is nearly the same as the total number of full-time faculty and staff from the prior year (420). When compared to five years ago, Point Park has increased the number of full-time faculty and staff by 24% (table 7.1)

Almost two-thirds (61%) of the full-time faculty are male while only 39% of the full-time staff are male, (table 7.2). Only 9% of both full-time faculty and staff are considered being part of a racial/ethnic minority (table 7.3). This is somewhat consistent to fall 2009 data when only 6% of the full-time faculty and staff were considered part of a racial/ethnic minority. To see a more detailed breakdown of full-time faculty by academic department and gender/race, refer to table 7.4.

As shown in table 7.5, the largest increase in average faculty salary from 2009 to 2010 occurred within the rank of 'instructor/teaching artist' (3.58%). The next increase in average faculty salary occurred within the rank of 'professor' (1.21%), followed by 'associate professor' (.92%). There was a slight decrease in average faculty salary from 2009 to 2010 for the rank of 'assistant professor' (-0.45%).

According to table 7.6, 56% of the full-time faculty are tenured in fall 2010 while another 32% are on tenure-track. The academic departments of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology, Business, and Education have the highest percentage of full-time faculty who are tenured (87%, 59%, and 57%, respectively).

Table 7.7 shows that the mean years of service for professors is at 25 while the other ranks have substantially lower number of mean years of service.

Fig. 7.1. Full-time Faculty and Staff



Fig. 7.3. Full-time University Personnel by Race/Ethnicity, Fall 2010



Fig. 7.4. Full-time Faculty Salary by Rank



Fig. 7.5. Tenure Status of Full-time Faculty, Fall 2010




BUDGET

BUDGET

The following schedules summarize the University's budget and results of operations for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2010. The budget is approved annually by the Board of Trustees. This section also highlights the University's trended historical endowment balances at the end of each respective fiscal year. The final schedule details the primary sources of revenue for the University, tuition and fees, and also reflects the historical trend of those costs.

The University relies primarily on revenue generated from tuition and fees. As illustrated in table 8.1, total tuition and fees represent 83.6% of revenue. The majority of auxiliary enterprise revenue is derived from room and board fees.

The University's operating budget (table 8.2) summarizes the primary expenditure categories. As illustrated, the largest category of Instruction and General Institutional Support directly funds the mission of educating students at Point Park. The second largest expenditure category, Student Aid, supports the fact that most Point Park students receive some form of internal financial assistance.

Table 8.3 illustrates how the University's collective endowment has increased over the years. The total endowment consists of two collective fund groups. It includes both donor-restricted endowment funds (the "Endowment Fund") which are classified as either temporarily or permanently restricted funds, and non-donor unrestricted funds that have been established by the Board of Trustees to function as reserve-type funds (the "Board Designated Fund").




Fig. 8.4. Annual Undergraduate Tuition/Fees and Room & Board

Table 8.4 and figure 8.4 provide additional trended historical information for the University's tuition, fee, and room and board rates. As stated above, these rates are approved annually by the Board of Trustees as part of the annual budget process.

Fig. 8.1. Total University Budget - Revenue, Fiscal Year 2010



Fig. 8.2. Total University Budget - Expenditures, Fiscal Year 2010



Fig. 8.3. Total Endowment Over Five Years


