#### **University Organization**

Point Park University is organized into two operational divisions: The Office of Academic and Student Affairs and the Office of Finance and Operations. Each division is led by a senior vice president who reports to the president, Dr. Paul Hennigan.

The Office of Academic and Student Affairs includes all academic programs, faculty and academic support staff, as well as the Office of Students Affairs, the Office of the Registrar, the Office of Institutional Research and Planning, and the Library. This division is led by Dr. Karen S. McIntyre, the Senior Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, Chief Academic Officer and Dean of Faculty.


The Office of Finance and Operations includes the Office of Human Resources, the Office of Business Services, the Office of Finance, Information Technology Services, Public Safety, which includes environmental, health and safety, Operations, which includes facilities, transportation and conferences/events, and the University Architect/Planner. Other key functions that report directly to the President include: Development and Alumni Affairs, led by Vice President, Rick Haskins; External Affairs, including Marketing and Communications, led by Vice President, Mariann Geyer; Enrollment Management, including Full-time Admissions, Graduate and Adult Enrollment, and International Student Services and Enrollment, led by Vice President, Gary Bracken; and Office of Legal Affairs, to be led by an internal General Counsel.

#### **History of the University**

Throughout its history, Point Park University has taken pride in its urban roots and contributions to the vitality of downtown Pittsburgh.

The University began as the Business Training College (BTC), which was founded in 1933 by Dr. Dorothy and L. Herbert Finkelhor as a proprietary school that prepared students for careers in the business world. BTC was located in downtown Pittsburgh.

In 1960, the state of Pennsylvania chartered BTC as Point Park Junior College, a tax-exempt institution of higher education. The College was re-chartered as Point Park College in 1966 and began awarding bachelor's degrees. Its first graduate program (journalism and communications) was established in 1981.

Point Park was granted university status by the Pennsylvania Department of Education in October 2003.

Point Park University acquired The Pittsburgh Playhouse (now Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse) in 1968. Its main campus remains in downtown Pittsburgh and includes more than 16 properties, including academic, administrative and residence halls.

To meet its growing needs, the University has acquired various downtown properties during the past several years. As one of the largest property owners in downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park's footprint extends down the Wood Street corridor from the Monongahela River to Forbes Avenue.

Approximately 4,000 students are enrolled at the University.

#### **University Profile**

Located in Downtown Pittsburgh, Point Park University is a comprehensive master's level university with a strong liberal arts tradition. Point Park enrolls approximately 4,000 full and part-time students in more than 90 majors and concentrations offered through its four schools. Its students represent 44 states and 56 countries.

Point Park offers bachelor's and associate's degrees in a number of majors, including accounting, allied health, animation and visual effects, behavioral sciences, biological sciences, biotechnology, broadcast production and programming, broadcasting reporting, business, business management, cinema production, civil engineering technology, criminal justice, dance (with concentrations in ballet, modern and jazz), dance pedagogy, economics and finance, early childhood education (assoc. only), education (pre-K-4<sup>th</sup> grade), education (4<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade), English, English/creative writing, electrical engineering technology, forensic science, funeral service, global cultural studies, health services, history, human resource management, information technology, instructional studies, integrated marketing communications, intelligence and national security, interdisciplinary studies, journalism, leadership and public service, legal studies, liberal studies, management services, mass communication, mechanical engineering technology, multimedia, organizational leadership, photography, photojournalism, political science, premedical and preprofessional studies, psychology, public administration, public relations and advertising, screenwriting, secondary education (biological science, citizenship, English, mass communication, mathematics), sport, arts and entertainment management, theater arts (with concentrations in acting, musical theater, stage management, technical theater/design).

The University has earned national distinction in a number of fields, including dance, theater, journalism and mass communication, and sport, arts and entertainment management.

The University also awards seventeen graduate degrees: the master of arts degree includes the following majors: clinical-community psychology, communication technology, curriculum and instruction, educational administration, intelligence and global security, journalism and mass communication, organizational leadership; the master of education degree includes: secondary education certification grades 7-12, special education grades 7-12, special education prekgrade8, teaching and leadership; the master of fine arts in acting; the mba degree includes master of business administration, global management and administration; and the master of science degree includes: criminal justice administration, engineering management, environmental studies.

Learning is an interactive process at Point Park where the average class size is between 15-20 students.

University facilities include engineering technology, science and computer labs; a television studio; photo and cinema labs; dance studios; and a radio station. Performing arts majors gain practical experience at Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse.

In recent years, the University launched the Academic Village at Point Park University, a multiblock living and learning hub that is transforming the University campus and the Downtown neighborhood it inhabits. It is redefining the student experience, campus life and Point Park's connection to the community.

As part of the Academic Village:

- Students, city residents and businesspeople are interacting in the Village Park, completed in 2011.
- World-class speakers, spirited performances, and athletic activities will inform and delight students in a new Student and Convocation Center.
- 40,000 theatergoers will attend performances at the Pittsburgh Playhouse, soon-to-be located in the heart of Downtown Pittsburgh.
- Environmentally friendly building techniques are creating sustainable additions to a revitalized Downtown district and campus.
- The energy and vitality of the 24/7 Academic Village will pulse across Downtown neighborhoods and unite Market Square and the Cultural District.

#### **Central Campus Development Project**

Point Park's vision is to be one of the most dynamic private, urban universities in America. The vision begins with facilities that give students, faculty, and staff the environment they need to excel.

In 2011, Point Park completed the Village Park. Located at Wood Street and Boulevard of the Allies, the 12,000-square-foot park features a canopy of trees, colorful plantings, a stunning glass stair tower, a dramatic water feature and a colonnade structure as well as a lively restaurant featuring indoor and outdoor dining areas.

In addition, the University completed Wood Street streetscape enhancements that include new sidewalks, pedestrian-friendly traffic signals and street resurfacing, in the fall of 2012.

Future projects include the Student and Convocation Center, which will incorporate a multipurpose student lounge, advanced computer labs, a fully equipped fitness center, and a 1,000-seat auditorium that transforms into an 1,800 seat space for convocation and community events.

#### Point Park University's Pittsburgh Playhouse

In 1968, Point Park breathed new life into the Pittsburgh Playhouse by converting it into the University's performing arts center. Now, Point Park will reinvigorate the Pittsburgh arts scene once again with the construction of a new Pittsburgh Playhouse on Forbes Avenue in Downtown Pittsburgh.

This premier performance and teaching venue will provide world-class professional spaces for both unconventional and classical presentations developed by the faculty, students and visiting artists of the Conservatory of Performing Arts. Students will benefit from a truly professional theater experience provided by three new performance spaces. An adjacent 10,000 square foot production area, costume and prop shops, and chorus and dressing rooms will allow backstage and production students to study and learn in a real-world environment.

#### **George Rowland White Performance Center**

Point Park University is an institution that utilizes green principles as it renovates. The George Rowland White Performance Center, which opened in August 2007, was awarded Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design or LEED Gold, one of the highest levels of certification in the U.S. Green Building Council's building performance program. The building is the first of its kind to receive LEED-NC Gold for new construction, according to USGBC statistics.

The George Rowland White Performance Center is a 44,000 square foot space featuring cushioned, non-slip floor, glare-free lighting and the latest audio and visual equipment. It contains the Performance Studio, Hilda Willis Tap Studio, and three Dance Studios.

#### **Residence Halls**

The University's residence halls include Conestoga, Lawrence, Pioneer and Thayer, as well as the Boulevard Apartments.

Point Park University is recognized as a leader in the economic development of downtown Pittsburgh. Its students, faculty and staff contribute more than \$73 million annually to the regional economy. The University's residence halls comprise the largest residential complex in downtown Pittsburgh.

#### **Athletics**

Point Park University, which fields eleven varsity sports teams, is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The teams include men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, softball and baseball, all of which compete in the Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

Point Park's teams are known as the Pioneers.



# ADMISSIONS and FINANCIAL AID

# **ADMISSIONS**

Overall, applications for admissions to Point Park University increased slightly from fall 2012 to fall 2013 (1.04%). At the undergraduate level, fall 2013 applications fell by only 4 or 0.08% (from 4,866 to 4,862) over the prior year. The largest decrease in applications was found with new full-time transfer/readmit undergraduates (6.31%) while the new accelerated undergraduates showed the largest increase (5.67%) in applications from the prior year. Point Park University has about a 74% acceptance rate for full-time freshmen (table 3.2). The fall 2013 acceptance rate for graduate programs is 63% (table 3.2).

Of all the 1,414 newly enrolled students, 59% (833) are female and 19% (270) are Black or African-American (table 3.6). The average age for full-time freshmen is 18 (table 3.7). For full-time transfers/readmits, the average age is 22 while the average age for new part-time undergraduates, accelerated undergraduates and graduate students is 32, 32 and 30, respectively (table 3.7). Of all the new students, 78% (1,104) come from Pennsylvania (table 3.7).

The School of Arts & Sciences enrolls the majority of the new undergraduates at 40%; the Conservatory of Performing Arts enrolls 24%; the School of Business enrolls 23% of the new undergraduates while the School of Communication enrolls 13% (table 3.8).

The School of Business enrolls 54% of the new graduate students; the School of Arts & Sciences enrolls 33% while the School of Communication enrolls 13% of the new graduate students. More detailed information of fall 2013 admissions data can be found on the following pages.

# Student Financial Aid

Table 3.10 shows undergraduates receiving financial aid has increased slightly (90% to 95%) over the last several fall semesters while graduates receiving financial aid has increased (86% to 88%) from fall 2011 to fall 2012. The total amount of financial aid received by Point Park University's students in academic year 2012-2013 represents a 1% decrease over academic year 2011-2012, from \$81,950,578 to \$81,058,239. However, the average award total increased 2% from \$19,563 to \$19,911 (table 3.11).

# **ENROLLMENT**

# **ENROLLMENT**

Enrollment increased over last year by 0.37% (from 3,827 to 3,841) (table 4.1). Of the 3,841 students enrolled, 84% (3,226 headcount) are undergraduate students and 16% (615 headcount) are graduate students (table 4.1).

Some other highlights include the fact that approximately 79% of undergraduate students are full-time, while only 41% of graduate students are full-time (table 4.3). The majority (79%) of Point Park's students come from Pennsylvania, (table 4.10). Also, the number of students living on campus in student housing decreased slightly. There are now 950 undergraduate students living on campus as compared to 975 last year (table 4.11). This represents 29% of the entire undergraduate student body. Further, 78% of all full-time freshmen are living in campus housing. Point Park remains an ethnically diverse university and its international student population represents 55 different countries (table 4.18).

Overall, 72 percent (2,777 headcount) of our students are from Southwestern PA counties (fig. 4.15). Within each school, 85% of Business, 84% of Arts & Sciences, 74% of Communication, and 34% of the Conservatory of Performing Arts are from southwest PA (table 4.19). From fall 2012 to fall 2013 the biggest increases in enrollment occurred in Beaver and Fayette counties while the biggest decreases occurred in Allegheny and Westmoreland (fig. 4.16). Southwest PA enrollment has increased 6% since fall 2004 (table 4.20).

This section includes a glance at fall 2013 enrollment data, as well as a detailed account of student enrollment trends over the past five years by various demographic features. For clarification purposes, some enrollment definitions are listed below.

#### **Enrollment Definitions:**

*Student enrollment* in higher education is described in terms of both headcount and FTE (Full-time Equivalence).

Student headcount is the count of individual students whose administrative records indicate that they were registered in a credit-bearing course as of the university's enrollment census date for each semester.

Student FTE is calculated using two different methods:

<u>Method 1</u>: Undergraduate FTE = FT headcount + (PT Credit Hours/15)

Graduate FTE = FT headcount + (PT Credit Hours/10)

Method 1: Undergraduate FTE = FT headcount + (1/2 PT headcount)


*Method 2:* Undergraduate and Graduate FTE = FT headcount + (1/3 PT headcount)

*Full-time Status* - An individual student is classified as full-time if he or she maintains at least 12 undergraduate credits or 9 graduate credits.

Fig. 4.2. Enrollment Trends by Student Type



Fig. 4.3. Enrollment Trends by Course Load and Division




#### An important note about recent changes to race and ethnicity coding

The U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) determined in 1997 that new race and ethnicity codes would be implemented for collecting all data reported to the federal government. They stated that these new codes allow data on ethnicity and race to reflect the growing diversity of our nation.

In 2007, the U.S. Department of Education posted to the Federal Register the "<u>Final Guidance on Maintaining, Collecting, and Reporting Racial and Ethnic Data to the U.S. Department of Education</u>" to implement OMB's 1997 Standards. The guidance issued by the Department covers two issues: 1) the collection of race and ethnicity data by institutions, and 2) the reporting of aggregate data to the Department.

Point Park University, in compliance with the Federal mandate, will now report race and ethnicity data that reflects students' ability to differentiate between race and ethnicity, as well as choose more than one race.


Thus, Point Park University will report the following new categories in all publically available periodic reports starting in the fall 2010 semester in order to be consistent with the proposed "single field" race/ethnicity codes:

- 1. American Indian/Alaska Native
- 2. Asian
- 3. Black or African American
- 4. Hispanic of any race
- 5. Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander
- 6. Non-resident Alien
- 7. White
- 8. Two or more races
- 9. Unknown

Since these new codes differ significantly from the old method of collecting and reporting race/ethnicity data, it is necessary to revise the tables in recent factbooks that reflect this change in methodology. Since it is nearly impossible to match old race/ethnicity codes with the new ones, trend data prior to 2010 will remain in the old reporting format. Beginning with the Fall 2010 semester, all data pertaining to race/ethnicity will show the new codes. Unfortunately, this means that direct comparisons of race/ethnicity between 2010 and any semester prior to 2010 will be difficult at best.

Fig. 4.6. Enrollment By Race/Ethnicity comparing Fall 2005 to Fall 2009



Fig. 4.7. Enrollment by Minority Status For ALL Students



Fig. 4.9. Average Age Between Fall 2009 and Fall 2013





Fig. 4.10. Enrollment Trends By Residency


Fig. 4.11. Undergraduate Students in Residence Halls

Fig 4.12. Enrollment Trends by Classification (all students)



Fig. 4.13. Enrollment by Academic School, Fall '13






Fig. 4.14. Enrollment by Academic Department, Fall '13




Fig. 4.15. FALL 2013 Enrollment - with a focus on Southwestern Pennsylvania Counties




Fig. 4.16. NET CHANGE in Enrollment between Fall 2012 and Fall 2013, with a focus on SouthWestern PA Counties

# RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

## RETENTION and GRADUATION RATES

Over the years, retention and graduation rates for <u>first-time</u>, <u>full-time freshmen</u> at Point Park University have remained relatively stable. This year, the University experienced a slight increase in freshman to sophomore retention (from 74% to 76%) (table 5.1, fig. 5.1), while the six-year graduation rate remained at 50%. However, the four-year graduation rate has increased to its highest level in five years at 42%. (See table 5.7).

Although the overall freshman retention rate has stayed approximately the same, there are some notable differences between schools. Specifically, the School of Arts & Sciences experienced a rather large decrease in freshman to sophomore retention (from 77% to 63%). The remaining three schools all experienced varying increases in freshman retention. The Conservatory saw the largest increase over last year (78% to 88%), whereas the School of Business and Communication saw modest increases (70% to 75% and 71% to 73%, respectively). There are also notable differences between academic departments within the schools and this data can be viewed in table 5.2.

After seeing marked improvement for "undecided" student retention in the fall 2009 (77%), 2010 (60%), and 2011 (62%) cohorts, Point Park experienced a sharp decline for the fall 2012 cohort (44%).

<u>Part-time undergraduate</u> retention decreased slightly over last year (58% to 53%). This cohort continues to be a difficult one to study due to the frequency with which they temporarily withdrawal (i.e., stop out). The retention rate for <u>accelerated undergraduates</u> increased significantly from 64% to 74%. <u>Full-time transfer undergraduate</u> retention also experienced a significant increase from 65% to 73%. Finally, <u>new graduate student</u> retention also increased from 78% to 84%. Once again, there are notable differences between schools and departments for each of these populations and this data can be viewed in tables 5.3 through 5.6.

Each year, the Office of Institutional Research and Planning prepares detailed retention reports on the various cohorts for analysis and decision-making. These reports show aggregated data by such variables as gender, race, age, on-campus/commuter, incoming high school grade point average, SAT/ACT scores and many other items. Some of this information is available in tables 5.8 through 5.14.

Fig. 5.1. Overall Fall to Fall Retention Rates by Student Type



## ACADEMIC PROGRAMS AND DEGREES CONFERRED

## ACADEMIC PROGRAMS And DEGREES CONFERRED

Degrees and certificates awarded by Point Park University are authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. The university confers degrees at the Certificate, Associate, Baccalaureate and Masters levels.

The University offers a total of 116 degree programs of study. This includes 99 degrees at the undergraduate level and 17 graduate programs. For a detailed listing, please see table 6.5.

During the 2012-13 academic year Point Park granted 894 degrees. After seeing many years of steady increases in degrees granted, the University experienced a decrease from previous years.

Of the 894 degrees granted, 38% were awarded by the School of Business, 13% by the School of Communication, 18% by the Conservatory of Performing Arts, and within the School of Arts & Sciences,11% by the Department of Criminal Justice and Intelligence Studies, 7% by the Department of Education, 7% by the Department of Humanities & Human Sciences, and 8% by the Department of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology (table 6.2).

The degrees conferred data in this chapter shows the total number of degrees awarded within an academic year. An academic year in this context is defined as beginning July 1 and ending June 30. This definition is consistent with the Pennsylvania Department of Education's definition and methodology for reporting degrees awarded.

Fig. 6.1. Degrees Conferred Trends





# FACULTY AND STAFF

# **FACULTY AND STAFF**

This chapter of the factbook pertains to full-time faculty and staff only. Part-time/adjunct faculty and staff are very transient populations, thus making it difficult to track and include in this chapter.

Overall, in fall 2013, there were 136 full-time faculty and 290 full-time staff. The total (426) represents an increase of 2 full-time staff while full-time faculty remained the same as the prior year. When compared to five years ago, Point Park has increased the number of full-time faculty and staff by 1% (table 7.1)

Almost two-thirds (60%) of the full-time faculty are male while only 42% of the full-time staff are male, (table 7.2). Only 9% of both full-time faculty and staff are considered being part of a racial/ethnic minority (table 7.3). This is a slight increase from 2012 where 8% of full-time faculty and staff were considered being part of a racial/ethnic minority. To see a more detailed breakdown of full-time faculty by academic department and gender/race, refer to table 7.4.

As shown in table 7.5, the largest increase in median faculty salary from 2012 to 2013 occurred within the rank of 'professor' (4.85%). The next increase in median faculty salary occurred within the rank of 'instructor/teaching artist' (2.00%), followed by 'associate professor' (1.19%) and 'assistant professor' (0.59%).

According to table 7.6, 65% of the full-time faculty are tenured in fall 2013 while another 24% are on tenure-track. The academic departments of Natural Sciences and Engineering Technology, Business, Humanities and Human Sciences, and Communication have the highest percentage of full-time faculty who are tenured (80%, 74%, 68% and 64%, respectively).

Table 7.7 shows that the mean years of service for professors is at 25 while the other ranks have substantially lower number of mean years of service.

Fig. 7.1. Full-time Faculty and Staff



Fig. 7.3. Full-time University Personnel by Race/Ethnicity, Fall 2013






Fig. 7.5. Tenure Status of Full-time Faculty, Fall 2013




# BUDGET

# **BUDGET**

The following schedules summarize the University's budget and results of operations for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2013. The budget is approved annually by the Board of Trustees. This section also highlights the University's trended historical endowment balances at the end of each respective fiscal year. The final schedule details the primary sources of revenue for the University, tuition and fees, and also reflects the historical trend of those costs.

The University relies primarily on revenue generated from tuition and fees. As illustrated in table 8.1, total tuition and fees, net of financial aid represent 83.5% of revenue. The majority of auxiliary enterprise revenue is derived from room and board fees.

The University's operating budget (table 8.2) summarizes the primary expenditure categories. As illustrated, the largest category of Instruction and General Institutional Support directly funds the mission of educating students at Point Park.

Table 8.3 illustrates how the University's collective endowment has increased over the years. The total endowment consists of two collective fund groups. It includes both donor-restricted endowment funds (the "Endowment Fund") which are classified as either temporarily or permanently restricted funds, and non-donor unrestricted funds that have been established by the Board of Trustees to function as reserve-type funds (the "Board Designated Fund").




Fig. 8.4. Annual Undergraduate Tuition/Fees and Room & Board

Table 8.4 and figure 8.4 provide additional trended historical information for the University's tuition, fee, and room and board rates. As stated above, these rates are approved annually by the Board of Trustees as part of the annual budget process.

Fig. 8.1. Total University Budget - Revenue, Fiscal Year 2013



Fig. 8.2. Total University Budget - Expenditures, Fiscal Year 2013



