- **3.** Articulate, demonstrate, contribute and produce written work for the screen and stage in a collaborative artistic, workshop environment.
- **4.** Identify and communicate (in oral and written form) the characteristics and distinctions of historically significant cinematic and stage works, including movements, filmmakers, playwrights and screenwriters.
- **5.** Think analytically and critically about written and visual media from a technical, commercial, and narrative perspective.

#### SECOND-YEAR PORTFOLIO REVIEW

Near the beginning of the second-year spring semester all BFA Cinema Arts students are required to submit a portfolio application. A committee that consists of full-time faculty from the program will review to determine if and/or how each student will continue on in the Cinema Arts department. Students will be notified about the decision of their application from the committee by the end of that spring semester.

B.F.A students are required to maintain a Q.P.A of 3.0 or higher.
