Point Park Career Records: Kelly's career average of .413 is the all-time record at Point Park. Kelly ranks third in school history with 74 career stolen bases.

Point Park Hall of Fame: Kelly was inducted in the Point Park Pioneer Athletic Hall of Fame in October 2010. His manager at the time with the Detroit Tigers, Jim Leyland, attended the induction ceremony.

## Point Park Baseball in MLB:

Kelly was the 15th and the most-recent Point Park player to be selected in the MLB draft, and he is the third former Pioneer to reach the big leagues joining John Stuper and Bobby Madritsch. Stuper, the head baseball coach at Yale, is best known for winning a game in the 1982 World Series with the St. Louis Cardinals. Point Park has had numerous players drafted with three reaching the big leagues.

Point Park has a long tradition of baseball success that includes 11 trips to the NAIA World Series. The Pioneers rank fifth all-time in NAIA World Series appearances.
