Professional Advancement

Brendan Mullan, Ph.D., assistant professor of physics, presented on the topic "Change and the Cosmos" Dec. 3 at the Tennessee Science Teachers Association Conference in Murfreesboro, Tenn. In his presentation, Mullan explained how change is inevitable and a fundamental part of the language of physics and the laws that govern the universe. In addition, National Geographic recently featured Mullan in the videos, "TIL: Why Mars' Ocean Disappeared" and "TIL: How to Transform Mars Into Our Second Home." which have resulted in more than 50,000 views on YouTube alone. Mullan was named a National Geographic Emerging Explorer in 2013 and is an internationally respected astrophysicist, science communicator and education program developer and director.

Tatyana Dumova, Ph.D., professor in the School of Communication, participated in the annual conference of the Pennsylvania Communication Association last September at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown. Dumova presented "Information Literacy Assessment in a University-Wide Core Theme Course for First-Year Students" as part of a panel on "Assessment in the Context of National Communication Association Learning Outcomes." She also made a poster presentation titled "Creating Clusters of Excellence within Graduate Programs in Communication" about the challenges facing graduate programs offered by small colleges and universities and strategies for potential solutions.

Paige Beal, M.B.A., assistant professor of sports, arts and entertainment management, presented on the topic "Storytelling Data" as part of a panel discussion on "Effective Strategies for Teaching

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Analytics" at the Marketing Management Association Educators' Conference Sept. 16, 2016, in Providence, R.I. "I shared techniques for teaching students how to deliver data analytics in a manner that is relevant and clear to their audiences. Some of these techniques include the creation of infographics and the use of visuals to make data easily understandable," Beal explained. She will serve as co-chair of the Marketing Management Association Educators' Conference, which will take place in Pittsburgh in 2017.

IN MEMORIAM

Milton Washington, a philanthropist and husband of educator and former chair of Point Park's Board of Trustees Nancy Washington, died on Oct. 22 at the age of 81. According to his obituary in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, although he "was not a native Pittsburgher, he chose to make a life in Pittsburgh where he made lasting contributions to this community while establishing himself as the leader of one of the largest black-owned business enterprises in the state. [Washington] was the founder and owner of Allegheny Housing Rehabilitation Corp. (AHRCO), an East Liberty-based company that provides housing for low-income people throughout the county ... 'He was a wonderful hus-

band and a wonderful father' said his wife of 55 years, Nancy. 'To work was what he actually believed in. That's the life he lived. He could not imagine a life without work? ... Mr. Washington was born in Philadelphia. He met his wife while she studied at the University of Pennsylvania and Temple University. They married and moved in 1968 to Pittsburgh, where he served as vice president of AHRCO. He purchased the company in 1973. He also owned a number of other successful businesses, including SSM Industries, Beacon Construction, Keystone Minority Capital, Twin Mills Timber & Tie Company and Temple Maintenance." Honoring Richard Rauh

Richard Rauh was honored as Outstanding Philanthropist of the Year at the 2017 National Philanthropy Day Awards, sponsored by the Association of Fundraising Professionals Western Pennsylvania Chapter (AFP-WPA). Rauh has a long history of philanthropy with Point Park and the Pittsburgh Playhouse. He has invested in students, and, more broadly, in the development of theatrical talent in Pittsburgh, as a University trustee (he is currently a trustee emeritus), as a teacher in Point Park's theater programs, and as a philanthropist. One of his largest gifts was to name the Rauh Theatre at the Pittsburgh Playhouse in honor of his parents. His father, Richard S. Rauh, was the founder of the Pittsburgh Playhouse and his mother, Helen Wayne Rauh, was an acclaimed actress at the Playhouse. He has also contributed to the purchase of equipment for the theatre, to scholarship funds for students, and contributed funds toward a program that enables students to showcase their work for professional theatre industry scouts in New York City. He has appeared on the Playhouse stage and contributed to Point Park's campaign to relocate the Playhouse downtown and transform the Playhouse into a national arts laboratory.

Lizarondo shared the startling statistics of food insecurity in Allegheny County nearly 172,000 people are food insecure; 43,000 of those are children. She and 412 Food Rescue volunteers have worked to cut costs and save more food by utilizing social media. The volunteers pick up food from food banks, universities, food retailers, wholesalers, restaurants and catering companies to deliver to families in need on the same day. Gallery gets new name, permanent exhibit by Linda Fletcher

hen the Lawrence Hall Gallery hosted its first exhibit in 2009, two names were at the forefront: artist Frank Mason and art patron Jack Tomayko. Now the gallery is home to a permanent exhibit, and those two names are a permanent part of Point Park University's artistic legacy.

On Oct. 25, 2016, Point Park hosted the opening reception for the exhibit of Mason's works — a gift from the Frank Mason estate — in the newly christened Tomayko Gallery. Their connection goes back decades.

"I was in a gallery in Shadyside in the mid-1980s and I saw a still life that [Mason] did," recalls Tomayko, a past member of the Point Park board of trustees. "It was an exceptional painting and I couldn't afford it, but I worked out terms to pay for it over time."

Later, Tomayko met Mason while attending an art convention in New York, and struck up a friendship.

Embracing the Arts

Tomayko's relationship with Point Park also goes back decades, to when he was pursuing a doctorate in health and physical education from the University of Pittsburgh in the early 1980s. "At the time, Point Park wanted to bring in a professional to look over health and recreation services, so they worked out an arrangement with Pitt," Tomayko says. "I was here for almost my entire Ph.D. program and stayed on for a year after as assistant dean of student development." Impressed with the energy of Point Park, Tomayko wanted to continue his involvement with the University. "Point Park is

unlike any place I had been to. It was easy to embrace the arts there, and during my initial collecting phase, I was able to make an impact," he says.

Some of Tomayko's favorite exhibits were 2011's Rivers of Steel, In addition to coordinating many of the exhibits in the gallery over with works borrowed from the Rivers of Steel National Heritage the years, Tomayko commissioned the bronze sculpture Freedom Area and the Duguesne Club; the 2013 exhibit of Joyce Werwie Bound by artist Paige Bradley, which has graced the Lawrence Perry's paintings of dancers; three shows that featured works by Hall lobby since 2008. s I look back on my own life and career, I believe what has helped me the most is getting out of my comfort zone," says Karen Larrimer (BUS 1991), executive vice president, head of Retail Banking and chief customer officer of The PNC Financial Services Group. "You need to seek opportunities to go above and beyond. "If I heard about something new, I wanted to learn more about it and get involved. "Getting out of your comfort zone helps you develop muscles that you don't even know you have. If you don't push yourself to do something you aren't sure of, you may never know that you can actually can do it," she says. That approach, "along with the experience of attending Point Park while I was working full-time, during my early career, has kept me in a continual state of learning."

time at PNC, Larrimer also held manage-
ment positions at Mellon Bank and served
as a sales executive for Ernst & Young.is known as a generous mentor, in and outside of her own
profession. A mother of four children ranging in age from six
to 28, Larrimer says "what I'm truly most proud of is that I've
been able to have a successful career while being a good
mother to my children, raising them well, and still being able
to make an impact on my community.

Larrimer was attracted to PNC's "culture of teamwork and focus on the customer, and that is what I still love today. I've been afforded so many opportunities to challenge myself." She was named chief customer officer in 2014 and assumed the leadership of Retail Banking in 2016. Prior to that she held various executive positions at PNC, including chief marketing officer and executive vice president for business banking, where she directed strategic planning, marketing, and product management and development.

When Larrimer accepted the position of chief customer officer, "it was a unique position in the financial services industry, and a real breakthrough. It was an opportunity for me to step into an enterprisewide role, across the entire company, and

create something from scratch. I knew it could have an incredible impact, and that was pretty exciting."

Role Model

Larrimer has been recognized as one of the Most Powerful Women in Banking by American Banker magazine (2015 and 2016); was selected to receive a Most Powerful and Influential Woman Award by the National Diversity Council's Pennsylvania Awards Committee (2014) and was a finalist for the 2014 Athena Award. She received the Girl Scouts of America Award of Distinction in Business (2013) and was named a Working Mother magazine "Mother of the Year" (2010), "Women Worth Watching" by Diversity Journal magazine (2009), and one of the Best 50 Women in Business in Pennsylvania (2003). Community service is close to Larrimer's heart. A board and executive committee member of United Way of Allegheny County, she will soon become the first woman in the history of the organization to serve as board chair. "I believe in the work of the United Way because of the significant, broadbased impact it has on the community in identifying and meeting critical areas of need," she says.

Larrimer is also deeply involved as a board member of The Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, "an incredible treasure that makes a great impact on the lives of children." She also serves on the board of directors for The PNC Foundation and Goodwill of Southwestern Pennsylvania.

For Larrimer, education is a lifelong endeavor. After graduating from Point Park, she went on to complete the Carnegie Mellon University Center for Executive Education Leadership Program. Today she serves on the board of trustees for Robert Morris University and volunteers on the Board of Visitors of the RMU Women's Leadership and Mentorship Program.

And as she travels each day to her office in the PNC Tower, across from the site of the University's new Pittsburgh Playhouse, Larrimer says she is impressed by Point Park's transformation.

"The growth of the University has been amazing," she says. "I drive through the campus area every single day and I am so proud of what I see, and of the vibrancy that Point Park has brought to the city of Pittsburgh. It's very exciting." �

A signed beam tops off Point Park's new Pittsburgh Playhouse, now taking shape in Downtown Pittsburgh

oint Park students, faculty and staff joined President Paul Hennigan, Board of Trustees Chair Anne Lewis and other friends of the University on Nov. 30 for a topping off ceremony for the new Pittsburgh Playhouse, now under construction in Downtown Pittsburgh.

Hennigan invited everyone to follow his lead in signing the final beam for the new Playhouse, which is situated on a 1.6 acre parcel between Forbes and Fourth avenues. It is set to open in 2018. "This is an important day in the life of the new Pittsburgh Playhouse and Point Park University," Hennigan said at the ceremony, which took place in the University Center adjacent to the Playhouse. "As you sign the beam, I would like you to think about what it represents for you."

A Rich Legacy

"For me," said Hennigan, "here is what it represents. The Pittsburgh Playhouse journey began over 80 years ago. After a couple of years of make-shift theaters, the Pittsburgh Playhouse organization bought the auditorium building on Hamlet Street in Oakland and built a larger stage. That theatre, which we now call the Rauh Theatre, is what is considered to be the original Pittsburgh Playhouse, and it was known as the Hamlet Theatre.

"Point Park College bought the current version of the Pittsburgh Playhouse in 1968, along with the Playhouse School, which was the beginning of Point Park's now nationally recognized theatre program. That was almost 50 years ago, and Playbill magazine just ranked us in the Top 10 on





Broadway," Hennigan said. "That was also the beginning of Point Park's highly acclaimed dance program, founded by Nicholas Petrov, who also started The Pittsburgh Ballet in the same year. Depending on which ranking you read, our Dance program is now either number two or three in the nation."

Crown Jewel

"So there is a lot of rich history in the placement of this steel beam," said Hennigan. "For me, the contemporary meaning is: This beam represents the crown jewel of the Academic Village Initiative."

The eight-foot steel beam, which remained in the University Center for two days after the ceremony to enable students and others to add signatures, was draped with a gold necklace from the costume and scenery shop of the Conservatory of Performing Arts. In early December, the signed beam (adorned with the costume necklace) was set in place high atop the Playhouse structure on the Fourth Avenue side of the complex, not far from the future location of the new prop shop.

Hennigan told those gathered for the signing ceremony that the new Playhouse will be a cultural hub and "an innovative

academic lab for the entire University." He added: "Performance students will use the studios and stages, theatre tech students will design and build masterful sets, and cinema students will use the sound stage."

In addition, he said, "Business students will run every aspect of the new Pittsburgh Playhouse, Communication students will do all of the marketing, advertising, promotions and social media, and Arts and Sciences students will host a wide variety of speakers and topics. Artists from around the country will flock to the new Playhouse to try out their new works."

Heartbeat of Downtown Pittsburgh

Hennigan added, "For the first time in 50 years, Point Park University will have its entire physical campus right in the heart of Pittsburgh.

"I believe it will become the heartbeat of Downtown Pittsburgh."

Construction of the Playhouse is about 30 percent complete. In December, the site was covered so work can continue on the complex throughout the winter. Off-site work currently being

done includes restoration of a stained-glass ceiling in the Stock Exchange Building, and restoration of the three Forbes Avenue facades that will be reused in the Playhouse's twostory outdoor courtyard.

Ryan Stana produces top entertainment events and paves the way for Point Park talent

Growing up as the only child of two entrepreneurial parents, Ryan Stana learned from a young age the value of taking risks and trying new things.

Stana is the founder and CEO of RWS & Associates, an Emmy Award-winning New York-based entertainment firm that produces brand experiences for top resorts, cruise lines, theme parks and New York fashion events. A 2002 graduate of the Conservatory of Performing Arts (COPA), he serves as a Point Park University trustee and has become a valued advisor to the University on the Conservatory and new Pittsburgh Playhouse.

Stana's company also recently acquired Binder Casting, an Artios Award-winning casting firm for Broadway, film and television, including *The Lion King, A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder* and Broadway's upcoming *In Transit*, written by Academy Award winner Kristen Anderson-Lopez (*Frozen*) and directed by Tony Award winner Kathleen Marshall. With this acquisition, RWS has created pathways for opportunities throughout performers' careers.

Big Dreams

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"My parents encouraged me to believe anything is possible, and whatever I imagined, they worked hard to make a reality for me," says Stana. His mother Shirley owns and operates Billy's Country Smokehouse, a family business still located on its original site in Greensburg, Pa., and his father Edward founded and was CEO of Tech Source, Inc., a manufacturer of tools and products aimed at helping to reduce air pollution.

As a young boy, Stana had two big dreams: to be a teacher and a performer. His parents helped make that a reality for their son by building him a little schoolhouse, "Complete with letterhead, lesson plans and an annual holiday musical, the whole thing," laughs Stana. The takeaway from his parents' encouragement was "anything I dreamed was possible with hard work."

In fact, Stana's work ethic and academic talents brought him to college while still in high school. As a sophomore at Hempfield Area High School, he explains, "I would take my core high school curriculum in the morning and earn college credit attending dance classes at Point Park in the afternoon." That

experience introduced him to Joe McGoldrick, Ron Tassone and Kiesha Lalama, academic and artistic mentors who, says Stana, "had such belief in me, it still humbles me to this day."

After graduating from Point Park with a bachelor of fine arts in theatre arts, Stana moved to New York to focus on production work. He soon landed a position as an associate producer with a company that produced corporate and retail events throughout the U.S. – and while it was a good job – he knew he would do things differently.

"So one day, on my way into work, I called my parents and explained my frustrations, and they said, 'Well, why don't you start your own business?" Stana took their advice to heart and quit his job the same day. He took a cab to a nearby Staples, bought office supplies and set up a desk in the corner of his apartment, launching RWS & Associates in 2003.

Fostering Talent

As a University Trustee, Stana relishes his role in fostering Point Park talent in the entertainment industry. A special focus is the role he plays at the Point Park senior showcase event in New York, where a select group of theatre and cinema majors have an opportunity to have their auditions adjudicated by a panel of professional agents and casting directors. "I'm always impressed with how Point Park grads are ready to compete," says Stana.

In fact, at his Long Island City office complex, Stana's staff of 35 full time and more than 2,000 seasonal employees includes several Point Park graduates, some of whom hold executive positions. In addition to his efforts with the senior showcase, Stana is also involved in Broadway Dreams, a nonprofit organization that provides performance training and mentorship opportunities to youth and young adults.

As the opening of the new Pittsburgh Playhouse nears, Stana believes the University is poised for even bigger and better things. "We need to think of the new Playhouse as having a global impact on arts education," he says. "It will be a state-of the-art facility unsurpassed for a university setting, and that's something for which we can all be proud." �

Point Park's International Media Class celebrates 10 years of educational travel supported by the John Fallon Travel Scholarship Fund





or the past decade, Point Park students have had opportunities to explore media and culture in countries around the world thanks to financial assistance provided through the John Fallon Travel Scholarship Fund.

Established in memory of the late Dr. John Fallon, a popular dentist and the husband of School of Communication professor Helen Fallon, the fund has made it possible for students with limited financial resources to participate in the annual International Media class and trip abroad at the end of the spring semester, as well as media trips to U.S. cities such as Washington, D.C. and New York City. More than \$40,000 in international travel grants, most averaging about \$1,000 each, have been provided to students since the first trip (to London) in 2008.

Open to Possibilities

Since then, more than 150 students have enrolled in the International Media class and traveled to such destinations as the United Kingdom, Ireland, Italy, Germany, Spain, Portugal and many more. Students meet regularly during the semester to learn about media, government, politics, economics and culture, then spend 1-2 weeks visiting media organizations and sightseeing in destination countries at the end of the course. School of Communication faculty members such as Fallon, Robert O'Gara, David Fabilli and Jan Getz (now retired) have served as faculty guides on the trips. For students, the experience "opens their eyes to the possibilities — personally and professionally," says Fallon. The class also exposes students to international perceptions of America and its citizens and is important in an era in which most news organizations have reduced foreign coverage, she adds. For participants such as Jessica Federkeil, a journalism major who traveled to Amsterdam, Bruges and London in 2016, it was her first time traveling abroad and "an amazing experience. It's so important to go out and see different cultures and learn new ideas, especially as a college student," said Federkeil. "I wouldn't have been able to take this trip if it wasn't for this class and financial assistance from the John Fallon Travel Scholarship."

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JAZZ PIONEERS

As an alumnus and frequent reader of The Point, I often peruse the magazine to see if I recognize any of my classmates from the mid to late 1970s. Several months ago, The Point did a wonderful feature on **Ron "Moondog" Esser,** a philanthropist and owner of Moondogs, the famous Blues music club in Blawnox, Pa.

Esser is also my former band-mate, who joined me and three other musicians to form what we [believe to be] the first-ever Point Park Jazz Ensemble in 1978. We initially used our jazz stylings to accompany [Point Park] dancers, who utilized our music to help prepare for dance performances.

We later renamed ourselves WOODSTREET, in homage to our downtown Pittsburgh location, and performed popular music including punk-rock sounds created by then-new groups such as The Police and The Cars. Of course, we also played The Beatles. We managed to stay true to our jazz origins by continuing to play contemporary funk-jazz tunes like "Mr. Magic" by Grover Washington Jr., and "Pick Up The Pieces" by The Average White Band, along with compositions by Count Basie, Dave Brubeck and Tom Scott. The band typically rehearsed in one of the dance studios [used] by students who studied jazz, ballet, Afro, tap [and more]. Needless to say, we had close ties with the student dance community.

Our quintet featured a diverse group of college kids who came from various parts of Pittsburgh and western Pa. I received my degree in journalism and communications in 1980. I continued in music after moving to Atlanta in the early 1990s, and currently perform with (and manage) a successful wedding band in Augusta, Ga. called "Play-Back-The Band," now celebrating its 25th anniversary.

In addition to Esser and myself, the Point Park band included: **Philip Smith** (tenor sax); **Phil Harris** (rhythm guitar) and **Tony Sanchez** (lead and rhythm guitars). I played drums and Esser was the bass player. Smith is now a successful businessman and entrepreneur in suburban Washington, D.C., Harris owns a bookstore in Sewickley, Pa. [and enjoys] a career as a music writer, and Sanchez continues practicing law in metropolitan Pittsburgh. I now live in suburban Washington, D.C., where I work as a technical writer in the defense contracting industry.

Philip Smith and I [recently reconnected through Facebook] and reunited about a year ago to trade stories, after a 30-year lapse in contact. In retrospect, he should be credited for having the fore-thought to form [the band]. He was a music major at West Virginia University before transferring to Point Park [and] was our unofficial band leader. \diamondsuit

WOMEN'S SOCCER WINS ANOTHER CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP

As the saying goes: One is an accident, two is coincidence and three is a pattern. But nothing about the Point Park women's soccer team's recent success is an accident or a coincidence.

Under the leadership of head coach Maggie Kuhn, the Pioneers have seen a complete turnaround of the program. Point Park has recorded 10-win seasons four of the five years under Kuhn and has reached the conference tournament every year.

More recently, the Pioneers won the River States Conference championship in the fall of 2016 knocking off the top-seeded Ohio Christian University 2-0, in the finals. It was the second conference tournament championship in a row to earn another trip to the NAIA National Championship Opening Round.

Increasing Momentum

From a team that was 26-86-5 before Kuhn's tenure, to a team that has won

49 games in the five years since, Point Park has seen a tremendous swing in momentum from the program.

"What excites me about coaching in general is seeing the student-athletes develop and get better," Kuhn said. "This is my first head coaching job, so I didn't really know what to expect, but what excited me the most about taking over the program was that I was going to be able to see what I could do."

Under Kuhn's tutelage, the Pioneers are yearly contenders for the conference title having experienced five years in a row in which they have reached the finals or semifinals (2012, 2013 and 2014) or were conference champions (2015 and 2016).

"What's important to me - especially when I'm recruiting players - is that I want the team to be a family," Kuhn said. "That means they're constantly working together to get better for the team, not for individual gain. I'm fortunate to be

surrounded by brilliant young ladies who are the reason this team is successful."

Team Progress

This season was the Pioneers' fourth 10win season and its third winning season in a row. After the first championship in 2015, Kuhn lost seven starters to graduation, including two first team all-conference players, as well as four second team allconference players.

With 19 new faces on the team for 2016, there was no guarantee of a trip to the conference tournament and barely a thought about the national tournament.

"I knew coming in we had a lot of quality, but I didn't know how they would mesh with the upperclassmen and adapt to the college level," Kuhn said. "In my opinion, belief is one of the most underrated gualities in moving a program forward, and that carried into the next season.

"I'm always talking to the team about being in love with the process – it's one thing to want to win a championship in August, but another to want to win when the season is over."

After a rough start to the 2016 season at 0-5-1 against a tough, non-conference schedule, the Pioneers hit their stride and came together as a team to go 6-2 in conference action and secure a second place seed and first-round bye in the RSC tournament. After defeating No. 3 seed Asbury (Ky.) University, 2-1, at Highmark Stadium, Point Park went on the road for the finals to face No. 1 Ohio Christian. The Pioneers lost to OCU. 2-1. in the regular season, but knowing this only added fuel to the fire.

Up to the Challenge

Kuhn said she knew the team had a shot at the conference title after beating Asbury and WVU Tech, two big wins in the regular season.

"We didn't play our best game against Ohio Christian in the regular season," she said. "I think we believed after we beat Asbury that we had a chance of beating any team in the conference as long as we brought our best game."

After a 2-0 win over OCU to clinch another conference title, the Pioneers were headed back to the NAIA national tournament. There they drew No. 2 seed Lindsey Wilson (Ky.) College, a perennial NAIA powerhouse and the same team they played in the 2015 national tourney.

The Pioneers did not back down from the challenge, holding Lindsey Wilson to only seven shots. Only four teams all year held the Blue Raiders to under 10 shots with the other three being nationally ranked.

However, the shots for Point Park did not fall, and the ladies were sent home with a 3-0 loss. Even though they all played a tremendous role on the team, Kuhn is losing only four seniors this year, which means that the majority of her starting



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lineup will be back and ready to defend the conference title in 2017 and continue the pattern of winning.

"I'm really excited about the future of this program," Kuhn said. "The ladies are already in the gym preparing for the fall. The future of this team is dependent on them and the effort they put in until next August." 🛠

VOLLEYBALL

Point Park volleyball won the River States Conference regularseason championship with a 15-1 conference record, which earned an automatic bid to the NAIA National Championship Opening Round. It was the third year in a row and the fourth time in six years that the Pioneers reached the national tournament. Point Park had a final record of 20-15 overall, and head coach Mike Bruno registered career win No. 400 in the regular-season finale. Seniors Shiloh Simonson (OH) and Emily Meng (S) were named all-conference first team, and sophomore Ashley Taylor (RS) second team. Simonson was RSC Player of the Year.

WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

The Pioneers placed third of 10 teams at the River States Conference championship and also gualified two individuals for the NAIA national

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meet. Junior Katie Guarnaccia was third in the conference, and sophomore Anna Shields was fifth to qualify for nationals, and both were all-conference performers. Freshman Jenny Murtha was also all-conference, and the team will not lose any seniors to graduation.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

The Pioneers placed sixth of 11 teams at the River States Conference championship. It was a very young team running for the Pioneers with four freshmen and three sophomores in their top seven finishers at the meet. It was a successful season that included a team victory at
